Governor's Ceremonial Desk


The Executive Branch carries out the laws and makes sure they are followed.

The Judicial Branch decides if laws are fair and how they can be used.








How a Bill becomes a Law:

Every law starts as an **idea**. You can share your ideas with your senator or representative.








A bill has to pass through committees in both the House and Senate. And *all* the senators and representatives get a chance to vote on the bill *three* times! They want to make <u>sure</u> it's a good idea for a law.






After the House and Senate come to an agreement, the bill is then passed on to the Governor to be signed. Now you know a little about what it takes for a bill to become a law!



Legislative Words

| Chamber: | A part of the legislature. There are two chambers in Hawaii's legislature – the Senate and the House of Representatives. |
|--------------|--|
| Committee: | A group of legislators asked to look at bills in a subject area, hold public hearings, and decide which bills should go to the full chamber. |
| Elect: | To vote to select a person to represent you and your community. The person with the most votes is the winner, and is elected to office. |
| Hearing: | A meeting where a committee hears testimony from the public, and makes decisions on bills. |
| Legislators: | Senators and Representatives – men and women we elect to represent our communities and us. |
| Oppose: | To say you don't like or don't agree with a point of view. |
| Support: | To say you like or agree with a point of view. |
| Testimony: | A person's speech or written message to a committee for or against a bill. |
| Vote: | To make a choice in a meeting or election. |
