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FOREWORD

This publication sets forth all of the requests made by the Hawaii State Legislature during the Regular Session of 2022 to agencies and officials of the federal, state and county governments and of quasi-public and private agencies. These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills passed, but some of which have yet to be approved by the Governor. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature, excluding annual and other reports requested on an indefinite basis. (New, first-year annual reports are included in this publication). These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate or House of Representatives or by both bodies of the Legislature. Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

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HB 956 HD1, SD2, CD1 (ACT 97)

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS, INTEROPERABILITY, STATE, COUNTY, AND FEDERAL AGENCIES. Requires the <u>statewide interoperable communications executive committee</u> to obtain the advice and input of the <u>statewide interoperable communications technical subcommittee</u>, and then shall:

- (1) Develop plans and strategies to improve public safety communications interoperability among state; county; and, if possible, federal public safety agencies;
- (2) Develop plans and strategies to provide interoperable communications between and among public safety answering points in the State and public safety responder communications networks, infrastructure, and systems;
- (3) Develop plans and strategies to promote statewide public safety communications interoperability utilizing state and county radio communication systems and networks, the Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network, or FirstNet;
- (4) Develop plans and strategies for the coordination of state; county; and, if possible, federal emergency alerts and warnings with public safety answering points and public safety responder communications networks, infrastructure, and systems;
- (5) Review and adopt plans and recommendations to improve or promote increased interoperability between public safety responders and other government or non-government stakeholders that support responses to emergencies; and
- (6) Submit a status report on the requirements of this provision, including any obstacles and proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requires the members of the statewide interoperable communications executive committee to include the following:

- (1) The <u>adjutant general</u> or the adjutant general's designee, who shall serve as the chair of the committee;
- (2) The attorney general or the attorney general's designee;
- (3) The <u>deputy director of the law enforcement division of the department of public safety</u> or the deputy director's designee;
- (4) The <u>chairperson of the board of land and natural resources</u> or the chairperson's designee;
- (5) The <u>state chief information officer</u> or the chief information officer's designee;
- (6) The director of transportation or the director's designee;
- (7) The director of health or the director's designee;
- (8) The chairperson of the Hawaii enhanced 911 board or the chairperson's designee; and
- (9) Four members at the executive or senior personnel level from the first responder or emergency management agencies from each of the four counties, to be selected by the respective heads of the first responder or emergency management agencies of each county.

Establishes a statewide interoperable communications technical subcommittee to provide technical advice to the statewide interoperable communications executive committee.

Requires membership of the statewide interoperable communications technical subcommittee to be limited to representatives from any governmental agency having duties that include management, planning, and operation of public safety communications systems and networks, including government land mobile radio and broadband networks and those related to emergency communications centers and public safety answering points; provided that:

- (1) The <u>statewide interoperable communications coordinator</u> shall serve as the chairperson of the statewide interoperable communications technical subcommittee;
- (2) The respective lead radio communication engineer or manager for the State and each county, or each lead radio communication engineer or manager's respective designee, shall serve on the subcommittee as subject matter experts for their respective radio communication systems and networks; and
- (3) The <u>respective lead information security manager for the State and each county, or each lead information security manager's respective designee</u>, shall serve on the subcommittee as subject matter experts for matters relating to cyber security.

HB 1179, HD1, SD1, CD1 (ACT 204)

GORSE, NATIVE HAWAIIANS, ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY FOR, MAUNA KEA, HAWAII ISLAND. Establishes a <u>pilot program</u> within the <u>Aina Mauna legacy program of the department of Hawaiian home lands</u> to remove and harvest gorse from Mauna Kea and develop it as a marketable product to expand economic opportunities for native Hawaiians.

Requires the department of Hawaiian home lands to submit to the legislature a report regarding the pilot program no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023, 2024, 2025, and 2026. Requires the pilot program to be repealed on June 30, 2026.

HB 1517, HD2, SD2, CD1 (ACT 222)

COFFEE LABELING, ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY. Requires the <u>department of agriculture</u> to conduct an independent study to assess the economic impact on local coffee farmers and the local coffee industry from potential changes to coffee labeling requirements established in section 486-120.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Requires the department of agriculture to consult with <u>coffee farmers</u>, including the <u>Hawaii Coffee Association</u>, <u>Kona Coffee Farmers Association</u>, and <u>other stakeholders</u> in the coffee industry for the purposes of conducting the study.

Requires the department of agriculture to complete the study no later than January 1, 2024, and shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

HB 1539, HD2, SD2, CD1 (ACT 46)

FEDERAL, STATE JUDGES, JUDICIARY PERSONNEL, SECURING ONLINE PERSONAL INFORMATION OF. Requires a <u>judicial security task force</u> to be convened and placed within the judiciary for administrative purposes. Requires the task force to examine, evaluate, and determine optimal methods for securing online personal information of federal and state judges and appropriate judiciary personnel, which may include requirements for nondisclosure or redaction of personal information on the Internet.

Requires the task force to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>administrative director of the courts</u> or the administrative director's designee, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task force:
- (2) The <u>director of public safety</u> or the director's designee, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task force;
- (3) The <u>special assistant to the administrative director of the courts for judiciary security</u>;
- (4) A <u>sitting full-time judge of the Hawaii state district court, circuit court, or intermediate court of appeals;</u>
- (5) A member representing the federal judiciary, who shall be invited by the co-chairs;
- (6) A member appointed by the governor;
- (7) The <u>attorney general</u> or the attorney general's designee;
- (8) The <u>comptroller</u> or the comptroller's designee representing the office of enterprise technology services;
- (9) The director of commerce and consumer affairs or the director's designee;
- (10) A <u>member representing the city and county of Honolulu, real property assessment division;</u>
- (11) A <u>member representing the law enforcement community</u>, who shall be invited by the cochairs; and
- (12) A member of the nonprofit sector, who shall be invited by the co-chairs.

Requires the task force to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on July 1, 2023.

HB 1568, HD2, SD2, CD1 (ACT 144)

FOOD CONTRACTS, LOCAL AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS. Requires the <u>department of education</u>, <u>department of health</u>, <u>department of public safety</u>, <u>department of defense</u>, and <u>University of Hawaii system</u> to each ensure that a certain percentage of the food purchased for public schools, youth campuses, public hospitals, public prisons, and any purchases made directly by the University of Hawaii for use in its academic programs, as applicable, is fresh local agricultural products and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products.

Requires the department of education, department of health, department of public safety, department of defense, and University of Hawaii system to each submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session on progress made toward meeting specified benchmarks.

HB 1579, HD2, SD2 (ACT 150)

OAHU REGIONAL HEALTH CARE SYSTEM, HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, TRANSITION TO. Amends Act 212, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, relating to the transition of the Oahu Regional Health Care System from the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation into the Department of Health.

Establishes a <u>working group</u> of the <u>Oahu regional health care system</u> and <u>department of health</u> to develop, evaluate, and implement any additional steps necessary to complete the transition of the Oahu regional health care system into the department of health.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of health</u> or the director's designee, who shall serve as co-chair and who, along with the chair of the Oahu regional system board or the chair's designee, shall have final authority over transfer activities to be implemented by the working group;
- (2) The <u>chair of the Oahu regional system board</u> or the chair's designee, who shall serve as co-chair and who, along with the director of health or the director's designee, shall have final authority over transfer activities to be implemented by the working group;
- (3) The <u>chief executive officer of the Oahu regional health care system</u> or the chief executive officer's designee;
- (4) One or more <u>department of health staff members</u> as deemed necessary by the director of health or the director's designee; and
- (5) One or more <u>Oahu regional health care system staff members</u> as deemed necessary by the chief executive officer of the Oahu regional health care system or the chief executive officer's designee.

Requires the working group to include the following members who shall serve in a consultative capacity:

- (1) One representative from the behavioral health administration of the department of health;
- (2) One representative from the department of human resources development;
- (3) One representative from the department of accounting and general services;
- (4) One representative from the department of the attorney general;
- (5) One representative from the department of budget and finance;
- (6) One representative from the office of planning;
- (7) The chair of the Hawaii health systems corporation board or the chair's designee;
- (8) One <u>representative from the Hawaii health systems corporation human resources</u> department;
- (9) One representative from the Hawaii health systems corporation finance department;
- (10) One representative from the state procurement office;
- (11) One <u>representative from the Hawaii Government Employees Association</u>, who shall be invited to participate;
- (12) One representative from the United Public Workers, who shall be invited to participate;
- (13) Community representatives as recommended and invited by the co-chairs; and
- (14) Others as recommended and invited by the co-chairs.

Requires the working group to submit reports to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2022 and 2025 that shall include the five-year pro forma operating and budget plan, ten-year pro forma capital improvement plan, proposed legislation to address any matters not covered by this Act that may be necessary to complete the transfer of the Oahu regional health care system into the department of health, and a timeline of major milestones necessary to effectuate the transfer of personnel, assets, liabilities, and contracts needed to complete the transfer pursuant to this Act. Requires the reports to also document the completion of the transfer and dissolution of the Oahu regional health care system.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on December 31, 2025, or upon completion of the transition of the Oahu regional health care system into the department of health, whichever is first.

HB 1586, HD2, SD1, CD1 (ACT 116)

MAJOR DISASTER FUND, FEDERAL REIMBURSEMENTS, DISASTER RESPONSE SPENDING. Requires no later than sixty days after any allotment by the governor or the expenditure

of any fund moneys, the <u>administrator of the Hawaii emergency management agency</u> to report to the legislature on the purpose of the allotment or expenditure.

Requires <u>each state department and agency</u> to submit to the administrator no later than August 1 of each year a report of all funds expended, if any, for the prior fiscal year by the state department and agency for disaster response. Requires the report to include:

- The source of funds, including the name and account number of the funding source;
- (2) The amount and purpose of each expenditure; and
- (3) Whether any programs, activities, or contracts were reduced as a result of disaster response spending by the state department and agency.

Requires the administrator to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than September 1 of each year on:

- (1) The amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State could have applied for during the prior fiscal year. The report shall indicate the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response broken down by department and agency;
- (2) The amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State applied for and the amount received during the prior fiscal year. The report shall indicate the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response broken down by department and agency;
- (3) The justification for any difference in the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State was eligible for and the amount the State applied for;
- (4) The average amount of time between the submittal of an application for a Federal Emergency Management Agency reimbursement and receipt of the funds;
- (5) The number of disaster accounts opened for the prior fiscal year; and
- (6) The information relating to the expenditure of funds that is reported by each state department and agency pursuant to this provision.

HB 1600, HD1, SD2, CD1 (ACT 248)

STATE BUDGET. Amends Act 88, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, relating to the State Budget.

PART III, SECTION 6.3

CONSERVATION DISTRICTS, USE OF FUNDS, ACCOUNTING FOR. Provides that of the general fund appropriation for the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (LNR141), the sum of \$500,000 for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended in accordance with chapter 180, Hawaii Revised Statutes; provided further that the <u>department of land and natural resources</u> shall submit a report accounting for the usage of funds to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided further that these funds are deemed necessary to qualify for federal aid financing and/or reimbursement.

PART III, SECTION 16.1

ENHANCED ELECTRONIC HUMAN RESOURCES SYSTEM. Provides that the <u>department of education</u> shall submit to the legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023, a report on the development of a plan to institute an enhanced electronic human resources system to reduce the burden of routine, manual, and time-consuming tasks to enable the department to provide accurate and timely personnel services information in response to

legislative inquiries; provided further that the improvements to the department's existing electronic human resources system shall include, but not be limited to, use of a single identifier for each position in the department to ensure accurate accounting and tracking of appropriated and unappropriated positions; addition of appropriated position information, including appropriated salaries and FTE; ability to generate user-friendly, real-time reports to respond to the needs of internal and external decision-makers; and ability to interface with other related systems; provided that the plan shall address how the department will:

- (1) Solicit input from the major system user groups to identify areas that need improvement or are not being handled by the current system;
- (2) Manage the enhanced electronic human resources systems project through a neutral facilitator and ensure the needs and perspectives of the major system user groups are represented;
- (3) Ensure proper governance and clear, shared ownership of the system that provides for ongoing collaboration across offices; and
- (4) Develop an ongoing process for identifying and prioritizing system improvements to meet the ever-evolving needs of the department;

provided further that the department shall include in its report how the plan will address each of these areas, and include a timeline and cost estimate to implement the system; provided that the department of education shall submit to the legislature a report on the plan and status of implementation no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024; provided further that the department of education shall submit to the legislature annual reports on the status of the enhanced electronic human resources system, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2025 and 2026.

PART III, SECTION 18.1

MAJOR DISASTER FUND, ITEMIZED REPORT, USE OF FUNDS. Provides that of the general fund appropriation for the unrestricted Major Disaster Fund for Hawaii emergency management agency (DEF118), the sum of \$500,000 for fiscal year 2022-2023 shall be expended for preparations for disaster response and recovery by the <u>department of defense</u>; provided further that an itemized report detailing the use of these funds shall be submitted to the legislature no later than August 1, 2023; provided further that any funds not expended for this purpose shall lapse to the general fund.

PART III, SECTION 65

GOVERNOR, USE OF AUTHORITY. Provides that any provision of this Act to the contrary notwithstanding, the federal fund or other federal fund appropriations made for operating costs authorized under this Act shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided that all federal fund or other federal fund appropriations made to be expended in fiscal year 2021-2022 that are unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date and in fiscal year 2022-2023 that are unencumbered as of June 30, 2025, shall lapse as of that date; provided further that the <u>governor</u> shall notify the legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report to the legislature of all uses of this authority for the previous fiscal year no later than September 1 of each year.

PART III, SECTION 67

GOVERNOR, USE OF AUTHORITY. Provides that any provision of this Act to the contrary notwithstanding, the governor may approve the expenditure of federal funds that are in excess of levels authorized by the legislature; that the governor may allow for an increase in the appropriate federal fund authorization ceiling for the program to accommodate the expenditure of the funds; provided further that the <u>governor</u> shall notify the legislature within ten days of each use of this

authority and submit a report to the legislature of all uses of this authority for the previous fiscal year no later than September 1 of each year.

PART III, SECTION 68

GOVERNOR, USE OF AUTHORITY. Provides that any provision of this Act to the contrary notwithstanding, the governor may approve the extension of the lapse dates for appropriated federal funds and appropriations of other means of financing, except general funds, deemed necessary to qualify for federal aid financing and/or federal reimbursement that are appropriated in this Act or authorized by the governor pursuant to section 67 of this Act as deemed necessary to meet the intent of the federal grant awards; provided that the <u>governor</u> shall notify the legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report to the legislature of all uses of this authority for the previous fiscal year no later than September 1 of each year.

HB 1619, HD2, SD2, CD1 (ACT 56)

PEER-TO-PEER CAR-SHARING, INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS. Requires the <u>insurance</u> <u>commissioner</u> to submit a report on the progress in the implementation of this provision, including but not limited to the number of complaints and the nature of the complaints and the effect of the coverage limits on victims involved in motor vehicle accidents with peer-to-peer vehicles, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

(HSCR 109-22, 537-22, 866-22, SSCR 3323, 3751, CCR 161-22)

HB 1741, HD1, SD2, CD1 (ACT 125)

PILOT VISITATION AND FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER, WAIAWA CORRECTIONAL FACILITY, OAHU. Requires the <u>department of human services</u> to continue to lead a <u>working group</u> to address visitation and support needs of children and families of incarcerated individuals pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 205 (2019) and Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 7, S.D. 1 (2019).

Requires the working group to determine the anticipated initial and annual costs to run a sustainable pilot visitation and family resource center at Waiawa correctional facility on Oahu.

Provides that beginning August 1, 2022, the department of human services shall work with the <u>department of public safety</u>, <u>family reunification working group</u>, and <u>other entities serving children and families affected by parental incarceration</u> to establish a pilot visitation and family resource center at Waiawa correctional facility on Oahu.

Requires the pilot visitation and family resource center to be operated by a <u>non-profit organization</u> contracted by the department of human services in cooperation with the department of public safety and other community stakeholders. Requires the staff of the pilot visitation and family resource center to include <u>trauma-informed professionals</u> who shall serve as liaisons and hookele for families affected by incarceration.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation and the estimated costs under this provision, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

Requires the working group to cease to exist on January 31, 2023; provided that the department of human services may continue the work of the working group beyond January 31, 2023, if the department deems it necessary.

HB 1775, HD2, SD33, CD1 (ACT 242)

CIVIL RIGHTS, TITLE IX. Provides that No later than September 1 of each year, the <u>University of Hawaii</u>, <u>department of education</u>, and <u>state public charter school commission</u> shall submit to the legislature a report that includes information pertaining to the immediately preceding school year, on the number and types of Title IX cases and other relevant information.

(HSCR 31-22, 448-22, 875-22, SSCR 3371, 3961, CCR 184-22)

HB 1800, HD2, SD2, CD2 (ACT 238)

CLIMATE MITIGATION, STATEWIDE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS. Requires the <u>director of health</u> to submit a report to the legislature by December 31, 2023, indicating a measurement of the 2005 greenhouse gas emissions in the State, including emissions from airplanes.

Requires the director to complete a greenhouse gas emissions inventory report each year beginning after 2017 to track emissions and determine the State's progress in the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. Requires the department of health to make these reports widely accessible, including to the public, as soon as they are available.

Requires the <u>Hawaii state energy office</u> to analyze pathways and develop recommendations for achieving the State's economy-wide decarbonization goals, including the statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit and goal to sequester more atmospheric carbon and greenhouse gases than emitted by no later than 2045 pursuant to section 225P-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Specifies analysis and development of recommendations.

Provides that in preparing the analysis, the Hawaii state energy office shall consult and collaborate with <u>other state agencies</u>, the <u>counties</u>, and <u>relevant stakeholders and organizations</u>.

Requires the Hawaii state energy office to submit a report of its analysis and recommendations to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

HB 1837, HD1, SD2, CD1

AFFORDABLE HOUSING, STATEWIDE WORKING GROUP. Establishes a <u>statewide working group on affordable housing</u> that shall meet annually to discuss opportunities to reduce zoning, regulatory, and statutory barriers to affordable housing development.

Requires the working group to comprise:

- (1) The <u>executive director of the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation</u>, or the executive director's designee, who shall serve as a co-chair of the working group;
- (2) The <u>executive director of the Hawaii public housing authority</u>, or the executive director's designee, who shall serve as a co-chair of the working group;
- (3) The <u>chairpersons of the respective standing committees on housing of the senate and house of representatives</u>, or their designees;
- (4) The executive director of the land use commission, or the executive director's designee;
- (5) The <u>executive director of the office of planning and sustainable development</u>, or the executive director's designee;

- (6) The <u>executive director of the Hawaii community development authority</u>, or the executive director's designee;
- (7) Representatives from each county agency having authority over zoning; and
- (8) Relevant stakeholders, as recommended by the working group.

Requires the working group to submit an annual report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, beginning with the regular session of 2023.

HB 1872, HD1, SD2, CD1

HUNTING, FISHING, FOOD SECURITY, SUSTAINABILITY STRATEGY. Provides that no later than July 1, 2023, each <u>department</u>, <u>office</u>, or <u>agency of the State</u> shall update the department, office, or agency's rules and policies to integrate the local hunting and fishing industries into any food security or sustainability strategies that the department, office, or agency employs.

Requires the <u>head of each principal department of the State</u> to submit to the legislature a report on the progress of that department and any agency administratively attached to that department in implementing this Act, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023 and 2024. Requires the report to include the department's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation.

(HSCR 581-22, 766-22, SSCR 3502, 3857, CCR 17-22)

HB 1932, HD1, SD2, CD1

CHILD WELFARE, CASE MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE. Requires the <u>child welfare services branch</u> of the department of human <u>services</u> to submit reports to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023 and 2024, including a status update on the development of the child welfare services case management software solution, findings and recommendations, and any proposed legislation.

(HSCR 344-22, 857-22, SSCR 3286, 3859, CCR 120-22)

HB 2024, HD1, SD2, CD1 (ACT 255)

MAUNA KEA STEWARDSHIP AND OVERSIGHT AUTHORITY. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii</u> to submit an annual report on the use of the reserved viewing or observing time, including the application of the priorities listed in this provision, to the authority and legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, commencing with the regular session immediately succeeding the expiration of the transition period established in this provision.

Requires the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight authority to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, beginning with the regular session of 2024. Requires each annual report to include:

- (1) A review of the authority's management actions;
- (2) A review of the implementation of all legislatively required plans, including financial and management reports, budgets, expenditures, and plans;
- (3) A review of the human uses of the natural and cultural resources of Mauna Kea and the impacts of the human uses on these resources;

- (4) A review of the commercial uses of the natural and cultural resources of Mauna Kea and the impacts of the commercial uses on these resources;
- (5) An assessment of cumulative impacts to Mauna Kea;
- (6) A review of all community dialogue, outreach, engagement, and consultation; and
- (7) A review of the University of Hawaii's use of its reserved viewing or observing time.

Requires the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight authority to submit:

- (1) An interim report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024; and
- (2) A final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

Requires the <u>auditor</u> to conduct a performance and financial audit of the Mauna Kea stewardship and oversight authority and shall submit a report on findings and recommendations to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2031.

HB 2171, HD2, SD1, CD1 (ACT 278)

PUBLIC SAFETY, CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION. Requires the <u>department of corrections and rehabilitation</u> to report to the legislature not later than twenty days prior to the commencement of the regular session of 2024, and every session thereafter, with its achievements, continuing improvements, and ongoing problems in providing the appropriate mental health care to committed persons under its jurisdiction.

Requires the department of corrections and rehabilitation to prepare and submit an annual report on the status of the federal reimbursement maximization special fund to the legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of each regular session. Requires the annual report to include a description of the use of the funds.

Requires the department of corrections and rehabilitation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, to report data to the legislature regarding:

- (1) Sexual assault by persons in custody against other persons in custody of the department;
- (2) Sexual assault by correctional staff against persons in custody of the department;
- (3) Non-criminal sexual misconduct by staff, including sexual harassment of persons in custody of the department;
- (4) Criminal cases initiated, and closed by dismissal, plea, or verdict, for sexual assaults by or upon a person in custody of the department; and
- (5) Civil claims filed and closed by dismissal, settlement, or verdict for sexual assaults by or upon a person in custody of the department.

Provides that within forty-eight hours, the <u>director of corrections and rehabilitation</u> shall report to the governor, and the governor shall report to the legislature, the death of any:

- (1) Correctional facility or community correctional center employee who:
 - (A) Dies on the grounds of a correctional facility or community correctional center where Hawaii inmates reside; or

- (B) Sustains an injury on the grounds of a correctional facility or community correctional center where Hawaii inmates reside that causes the death of the employee; or
- (2) Hawaii inmate who is incarcerated in a state or contracted correctional facility.

Requires the report to include the following information:

- (1) The name of the decedent; provided that this information is not protected from disclosure by state or federal law;
- (2) The gender and age of the decedent;
- (3) Whether the decedent was an inmate or an employee;
- (4) The location of the death or injury leading to the death;
- (5) The date and time of the death;
- (6) The cause of death; and
- (7) Any indication of sexual assault leading to the death;

provided that when the official cause of death has been determined, the director shall immediately report the official cause of death to the governor, and the governor shall immediately report the official cause of death to the legislature.

Provides that within thirty days of a death described this provision, the director shall submit a report to the governor, and the governor shall submit the report to the legislature, of the clinical mortality review conducted in response to the death, including correctional actions to be taken.

Provides that it is the intent of this Act not to jeopardize the receipt of any federal aid nor to impair the obligation of the State or any agency thereof to the holders of any bond issued by the State or by any agency, and to the extent, and only to the extent, necessary to effectuate this intent, the <u>governor</u> may modify the strict provisions of this Act, but shall promptly report any modifications with the reasons therefor to the legislature at its next session thereafter for review by the legislature.

Requires the <u>department of law enforcement</u> to report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023, the progress made in preparing for the transfer of law enforcement functions to the department on January 1, 2024.

HB 2195, HD2, SD1, CD1 (ACT 153)

CESSPOOL COMPLIANCE PILOT GRANT PROJECT. Establishes in the department of health the <u>cesspool compliance pilot grant project</u> to assist property owners, including lessees on Hawaiian home lands, with upgrading, converting, or connecting a cesspool that, according to the department of health, meets the requirements of this provision.

Requires the <u>department of health</u> to submit to the legislature a report on the cesspool compliance pilot grant project, including any findings and recommendations, and any proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

HB 2309, HD2, SD2, CD1 (ACT 117)

RECIDIVISM RATES, DIVERSION, REENTRY, AND REHABILITATION. Requires the <u>department of public safety</u>, <u>Hawaii paroling authority</u>, and <u>department of health</u> to each submit to the legislature, no

later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024, a report of its respective findings and recommendations. Requires each report to include the following information:

- (1) The manner in which funds received pursuant to this Act have been expended;
- (2) The particular service providers involved;
- (3) The number of persons who have been served;
- (4) A description of the services provided;
- (5) Measurable outcomes; and
- (6) Any proposed legislation.

(HSCR 130-22, 627-22, 909-22, SSCR 3315, 3968, CCR 122-22)

HB 2421, HD1, SD2, CD1 (ACT 243)

WOMEN'S COURT PILOT PROGRAM. Requires the <u>judiciary</u> to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the governor and legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023, 2024, and 2025, regarding:

- (1) The status of the women's court pilot program;
- (2) The number of women accepted into the pilot program;
- The number of women who were eligible to participate in the pilot program but who could not be accepted into the program because of program limitations;
- (4) The number of women completing the pilot program;
- (5) The number of women who were removed from the pilot program; and
- (6) Recommendations as to whether the women's court pilot program should:
 - (A) Continue as a pilot program;
 - (B) Expand to include additional participants;
 - (C) Provide additional services; or
 - (D) Be discontinued.

Requires Act be repealed on June 30, 2025.

CHILD WELFARE SERVICES. Requires the <u>department of human services</u> to collect and analyze data to determine the impact of expanding home visits to families receiving adoption assistance or legal guardianship assistance and shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

Requires the Malama Ohana working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>executive director of Effective Planning and Innovative Communication, Inc., doing business as EPIC 'Ohana</u>, or the executive director's designee, who shall serve as cochair of the working group;
- (2) The <u>chief executive officer of Hale Kipa, Inc.</u>, or the chief executive's designee, who shall serve as co-chair of the working group;
- (3) Four members of Nā Kama a Hāloa;
- (4) Two members from each of the following constituencies, identified by Nā Kama a Hāloa:
 - (A) Former foster youth;
 - (B) <u>Birth parents who were involved in the child welfare system, specifically with the department of human services' child welfare services branch;</u>

- (C) Licensed resource caregivers; and
- (D) Kinship resource caregivers;
- (5) The <u>director of human services</u>, or the director's designee;
- (6) Two members representing the child welfare services branch's investigators, case managers, or their assistants, designated by the branch administrator;
- (7) The <u>chairperson of the trauma-informed care task force</u> established pursuant to Act 209, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, or the chairperson's designee;
- (8) The <u>chief executive officer of the office of Hawaiian affairs</u>, or the chief executive officer's designee:
- (9) The <u>chief executive officer of Kamehameha Schools</u>, or the chief executive officer's designee; and
- (10) The chief executive officer of Lili'uokalani Trust, or the chief executive officer's designee.

Requires the Malama Ohana working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

HB 2511, HD2, SD2, CD1

BENEFICIARIES, WAITLIST, DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS. Requires the <u>department of Hawaiian home lands</u> to develop a strategic plan to address the following applicant preferences reflected in the 2020 Beneficiaries Study Applicant Report:

- (1) Seventy-six per cent of individuals on the department of Hawaiian home lands waiting list who prefer a lot with a single-family home or a vacant lot for a house; and
- (2) Sixteen per cent of individuals on the department of Hawaiian home lands waiting list who prefer to rent or rent-to-own a single-family home, duplex, apartment, or townhouse, with the option to buy in the future.

Requires the department of Hawaiian home lands to submit the strategic plan, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than December 10, 2022.

Requires the department of Hawaiian home lands to submit an annual report to the legislature on the first day of each regular session that includes:

- (1) An accounting of the expenditures for the purposes of this Act in the previous fiscal year; and
- (2) The number of applicants on the waiting list assisted.

SB 2021, SD1, HD2, CD1 (ACT 226)

OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS, PRO RATA SHARE OF PUBLIC LAND TRUST, PAYMENT AMOUNT FOR. Establishes a <u>working group</u> to account for all ceded lands in the public land trust inventory; account for all income and proceeds from the public land trust; and subsequently determine the twenty per cent pro rata share of income and proceeds from the public land trust due annually to the office of Hawaiian affairs for the betterment of the conditions of Native Hawaiians.

Requires the working group to be comprised of six <u>members</u>, three of whom three shall be appointed by the <u>governor</u> and three of whom shall be appointed by the <u>office of Hawaiian affairs board of</u> trustees.

Requires the working group, with the cooperation of any <u>department or agency that uses, manages, or receives income, proceeds, or any other funds derived from the public land trust, to prepare and submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation and the amount it determines for the annual amount of the twenty per cent pro rata share of income and proceeds from the public land trust, to the legislature.</u>

Requires the office of Hawaiian affairs to provide any necessary administrative support, including preparation of the report required by this provision, to the working group.

SB 2056, SD1, HD1, CD1 (ACT 189)

SOIL CLASSIFICATION SYSTEMS, REGULATION OF AGRICULTURAL LANDS. Requires the office of planning and sustainable development to conduct a study of the suitability of soil classification systems, including the soil overall (master) productivity rating system and detailed land classification of the land study bureau, for the regulation of agricultural lands by the State and counties.

Provides that in conducting the study required by this Act, the office of planning and sustainable development shall request, as appropriate, the assistance of the <u>department of agriculture</u>, <u>college of tropical agriculture and human resources of the University of Hawaii at Manoa</u>, and the <u>land use commission</u>, which shall cooperate with and provide any necessary resources to the office of planning and sustainable development. Allows the office of planning and sustainable development to further consult with the <u>United States Department of Agriculture</u>, if necessary.

Requires the office of planning and sustainable development to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

SB 2076, SD2, HD3, CD1 (ACT 231)

BROADBAND INFRASTRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE TO IMPLEMENT, OPERATE, AND MAINTAIN. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> and <u>Hawaii broadband and digital equity office</u> to jointly convene a <u>working group</u> to determine the appropriate governance structure to implement, operate, and maintain broadband infrastructure development in the State.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members, or their designees:

- (1) The president of the University of Hawaii, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (2) The strategic broadband coordinator, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (3) The director of finance;
- (4) The director of commerce and consumer affairs;
- (5) The comptroller;
- (6) The director of business, economic development, and tourism;
- (7) The director of health:
- (8) The <u>superintendent of education</u>;
- (9) The chairperson of the Hawaiian homes commission; and
- (10) The mayors of the counties.

Requires the co-chairs of the working group to invite the following individuals to become members of the working group:

- (1) The governor;
- (2) The State's congressional delegation;
- (3) Representatives from private sector partners; and
- (4) Others as recommended by the working group.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

SB 2185, SD3, HD1, CD1 (ACT 49)

FIREWORKS, AUDIT. Requires the <u>auditor of fireworks and articles pyrotechnic records</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session detailing the inventory, recordkeeping, and sales of fireworks to license or permit holders.

(SSCR 2406, 3010, HSCR 1222-22, 1830-22, CCR 178-22)

SB 2218, SD1, HD1, CD2

FOOD HUB PILOT PROGRAM. Establishes a five-year <u>food hub pilot program</u>, which shall be administered by the department of agriculture. Requires the food hub pilot program to terminate on June 30, 2027.

Requires the department of agriculture to submit interim reports on:

- (1) The department's progress in implementing this Act;
- (2) Preliminary results of the food hub pilot program; and
- (3) The department's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation,

to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023, 2024, 2025, and 2026.

Requires the department of agriculture to submit a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027. Requires the report to include the results of the food hub pilot program and a recommendation as to whether the program should be made permanent, with or without modifications.

RENEWABLE HYDROGEN, DECARBONIZED ENERGY SYSTEM AND ECONOMY. Requires the <u>Hawaii natural energy institute</u> to conduct a study to examine the potential for the production and use of renewable hydrogen in the State and the potential role of renewable hydrogen in achieving a local, affordable, reliable, and decarbonized energy system and economy.

Provides that in conducting the study, the Hawaii natural energy institute shall, as appropriate, consult with the <u>department of business</u>, <u>economic development</u>, <u>and tourism</u>; <u>Hawaii state energy office</u>; <u>public utilities commission</u>; or <u>any other applicable state or county agency</u>. Requires the Hawaii natural energy institute to further consult with <u>electric and gas utilities</u> and other <u>industry stakeholders</u>, who are encouraged to cooperate and provide information or input.

Requires the Hawaii natural energy institute to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, from the study to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

SB 2359, SD1, HD1 (ACT 141)

K-12 EXPANDED TEACHING COHORT PROGRAMS, UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII. Provides that no later than twenty days before the regular sessions of 2023, 2024, and 2025, the <u>University of Hawaii</u> shall submit interim reports to the legislature concerning its establishment of K-12 expanded teaching cohort programs in each county for students who are pursuing undergraduate degrees in education.

Provides that no later than twenty days before the regular session of 2026, the University of Hawaii shall submit a final report to the legislature concerning its establishment of K-12 expanded teaching cohort programs in each county for students who are pursuing undergraduate degrees in education.

Requires Act to be repealed on December 31, 2026.

HOMELESSNESS, ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT. Requires the <u>governor's coordinator on homelessness</u> to submit an annual progress report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session. Requires the report to include:

- (1) Performance metrics relating to reducing the number of persons experiencing homelessness in the State;
- (2) Performance metrics relating to housing and services inventory gaps, including but not limited to the number of persons experiencing homelessness served and placed into permanent housing and the cost per person served; and
- (3) Performance metrics to evaluate the State's performance on homeless services, housing, care coordination, and other needed services to end homelessness in the State.

PULEHUNUI COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT, MAUI. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, the <u>Hawaii community development authority</u> shall submit to the legislature an annual comprehensive report on the progress of development within the Pulehunui community development district.

SB 2473, SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 219)

HAWAII AGRIBUSINESS PLAN. Requires the <u>agribusiness development corporation</u> to prepare and post on its website the <u>Hawaii agribusiness plan</u>, which shall define and establish goals, objectives, policies, and priority guidelines for its agribusiness development strategy.

Requires the agribusiness development corporation to update the Hawaii agribusiness plan no later than July 1, 2023, and every five years thereafter, and shall incorporate the plan in its annual report to the governor and the legislature as provided in section 163D-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

SB 2474, SD2, HD1, CD1 (ACT 201)

HAWAII'S ELECTRIC SYSTEM, ACCESSIBILITY OF, PROCEDURES FOR INTERCONNECTION TO. Requires the <u>public utilities commission</u> to contract with a <u>qualified consultant</u> to conduct a study on the accessibility of Hawaii's electric system and procedures for interconnection to Hawaii's electric system, including but not limited to the timeliness and costs of interconnection.

Requires the public utilities commission to submit the study required by this Act and a report, including its progress in contracting an entity to serve as the <u>Hawaii electric reliability administrator</u> pursuant to section 269-147, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

SB 2478 SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 216)

RENEWABLE FUELS PRODUCTION TAX CREDIT. Provides that following each calendar year in which a credit under this provision has been claimed, the <u>chief energy officer of the Hawaii state</u> <u>energy office</u> shall submit a written report to the governor and legislature regarding the production and sale of renewable fuels.

(SSCR 2096, 2857, HSCR 1056-22, 1416-22, 1957-22, CCR 181-22)

SB 2482, SD1, HD1, CD1

OFFICE OF WELLNESS AND RESILIENCE, ANNUAL REPORT. Requires the <u>office of wellness and resilience</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session that contains a summary of its activities during the preceding year, including:

- (1) Actions taken to address issues, unmet needs, and challenges relating to wellness and resilience:
- (2) Funds received pursuant to the activities of the office from federal, state, private, and philanthropic sources;
- (3) The office's engagement with community entities and other stakeholders; and
- (4) Any other findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation.

SB 2510, SD2, HD1, CD1

ENERGY STATE FUNCTIONAL PLAN. Requires the <u>office of planning and sustainable development</u> to update the energy state functional plan to include a diversified renewable energy portfolio and firm renewable energy for electricity generation to enhance the State's energy security, resilience, and sustainability. Requires the updated energy state functional plan to be integrated into any future updated functional plans. Requires the updated energy state functional plan to be submitted to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2023 legislative session. Requires the office of planning and sustainable development to submit an annual report to the legislature

regarding progress to the energy state functional plan. Allows the energy state functional plan to be updated every five years.

Requires the office of planning and sustainable development to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session. Requires this report to contain detailed information regarding the status of the plan and related policies.

FIRM RENEWABLE ENERGY GENERATION. Requires the <u>Hawaii natural energy institute</u> to conduct a study to update the minimum percentage of firm renewable generation for each island and the maximum proportion of any one renewable energy source on each island. Allows this study to be updated every five years. Requires the Hawaii natural energy institute to submit to the legislature a report on the study twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

SB 2624, SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 158)

TELEHEALTH, RURAL HEALTH CARE. Provides that within six months of the exhaustion of all <u>rural</u> <u>health care pilot project</u> funds, the <u>department of health</u> shall submit to the legislature an evaluation report on the rural health care pilot project's outcomes, including the quality of care, patient satisfaction, training and workforce development issues, the financial sustainability of the pilot project, and any proposed legislation.

(SSCR 2449, 3081, HSCR 1081-22, 1437-22, 1998-22, CCR 227-22)

SB 2644, SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 68)

ELECTRICAL CONTRACTORS, BOARD OF ELECTRICIANS AND PLUMBERS. Amends Act 60, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, relating to electrical contractors.

Requires the <u>board of electricians and plumbers</u> to submit reports to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023, 2024, 2025, 2026, and 2027. Requires the reports to include but not be limited to the following:

- (1) Any programs in the State that offer vocational training for licensed electricians to perform high voltage electrical work;
- (2) Availability of continuing education, training, or both, necessary for licensed electricians to acquire or keep current those skills related to performing high voltage work;
- (3) The number of licensed electricians in the State qualified to perform high voltage electrical work; and
- (4) Opportunities for growth in the high voltage work subspecialty.

(SSCR 2134, 2903, HSCR 1040-22, 1428-22, 1672-22, CCR 179-22)

SB 2695, SD2, HD1, CD1 (ACT 70)

BLOCKCHAIN, CRYPTOCURRENCY, TASK FORCE. Establishes the <u>blockchain and cryptocurrency task force</u> to be placed within the department of commerce and consumer affairs for administrative purposes.

Requires the task force to consist of the following members:

- (1) One <u>member of the senate</u> and one <u>member of the house of representatives</u>, who shall be appointed by the <u>president of the senate</u> and <u>speaker of the house of representatives</u>, respectively, and who shall serve as co-chairpersons of the task force;
- (2) The director of finance, or the director's designee;
- (3) The <u>director of commerce and consumer affairs</u>, or the director's designee;
- (4) The commissioner of financial institutions, or the commissioner's designee;
- (5) A <u>president or chief financial officer of a Hawaii-based cryptocurrency company</u>, who shall be appointed by the <u>governor</u>;
- (6) A <u>representative from a Hawaii-based bank or financial institution</u>, who shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives;
- (7) A <u>representative of a Hawaii-based cryptocurrency exchange</u>, who shall be appointed by the president of the senate;
- (8) A <u>representative of a blockchain payments solution company</u>, who shall be appointed by the governor;
- (9) A <u>professor from the University of Hawaii who specializes in digital currency</u>, who shall be appointed by the <u>president of the University of Hawaii</u>;
- (10) A <u>representative of a company with a business model that uses blockchain for non-cryptocurrency transaction purposes</u>, who shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives:
- (11) A <u>representative of a blockchain or cryptocurrency association</u>, who shall be appointed by the president of the senate;
- (12) A <u>representative of a blockchain or cryptocurrency security community</u>, who shall be appointed by the governor;
- (13) A <u>representative of the blockchain or cryptocurrency legal community</u>, who shall be appointed by the governor; and
- (14) One member of the public who shall be appointed by the governor.

Requires the task force to:

- (1) Meet as often as the co-chairpersons deem necessary, which may include conducting meetings via interactive conference technology;
- (2) Review data and other aspects of the blockchain and cryptocurrency industry throughout the country, including but not limited to the development of a plan to expand blockchain adoption in both the private and public sectors, to be regulated within the jurisdiction and purview of the department of commerce and consumer affairs;
- (3) Recommend appropriate licensure requirements and a regulatory framework for this new evolving industry;
- (4) Observe and monitor the past and current activities of the Hawaii digital currency innovation lab, a "sandbox" program conducted by department of commerce and consumer affairs' division of financial institutions and Hawaii technology development corporation;
- (5) Analyze how the current framework of the Hawaii digital currency innovation lab fits into the State's financial environment;
- (6) Consider aspects of the Hawaii digital currency innovation lab that may be effective and practical in the implementation of the recommended regulatory framework;
- (7) Compile an overview of potential legislation;
- (8) Solicit ideas and opinions of industry experts on additional legislation; and
- (9) Submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024, at which point the task force shall dissolve.

CHILD WELLNESS INCENTIVE PILOT PROGRAM, WELL-CHILD EXAMINATIONS. Requires the <u>department of human services</u> to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, regarding the <u>child wellness incentive pilot program</u> to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

SCHOOL SUPPLY SUBSIDY PILOT PROGRAM, NAALEHU ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, HAWAII ISLAND. Requires the <u>department of education</u> to submit a report of its findings and recommendations regarding the <u>school supply subsidy pilot program</u>, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT. Requires the <u>transit-oriented development infrastructure improvement district board</u> to submit an annual comprehensive report on the progress of development within the district to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

HEALTHY SOILS PROGRAM. Requires the <u>department of agriculture</u> to submit a report detailing the status and progress of the healthy soils program and its recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

FARMER APPRENTICE MENTORING PROGRAM. Requires the <u>department of agriculture</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session. Requires the report to include, at a minimum:

- (1) The number of farmer apprentices enrolled in the <u>farmer apprentice mentoring program</u> during the preceding year;
- (2) A listing of each qualified farmer mentorship provider;
- (3) An assessment of the ability of farmer mentorship providers participating in the program to complete any program objectives and work tasks identified by the department of agriculture; and
- (4) An evaluation of the results achieved by the program, to be written, to the extent possible, in measurable and quantifiable terms.

SAFE SPACES FOR YOUTH PILOT PROGRAM. AIR NOISE AND SAFETY TASK FORCE. Establishes an <u>air noise and safety task force</u> in the office of planning and sustainable development for administrative purposes.

- (1) Collect and review data on tour aircraft operations submitted to the department of transportation pursuant to this provision and any other information related to aircraft noise and safety that may be available;
- (2) Collect and review public complaints regarding aircraft noise and safety;
- (3) Identify key noise and safety issues facing Hawaii relating to aircraft;
- (4) Make recommendations to address aircraft noise and safety issues to the Federal Aviation Administration, National Transportation Safety Board, and other appropriate federal agencies;
- (5) Make recommendations to address business practices and operators of aircraft falling within state and local jurisdiction; and
- (6) Make recommendations to address aircraft noise and safety issues to aircraft operators.

Requires the members of the task force to include:

- (1) A <u>member of the senate</u> appointed by the <u>president of the senate</u>, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task force:
- (2) A <u>member of the house of representatives</u> appointed by the <u>speaker of the house of representatives</u>, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task force;
- (3) The director of transportation or their designee; and
- (4) The director of planning or their designee.

Requires the co-chairs of the task force to invite the following persons to join the task force:

- (1) A representative from the Federal Aviation Administration;
- (2) A representative from the National Transportation Safety Board;
- (3) At least one representative from the helicopter industry;
- (4) At least one representative from the small aircraft industry; and
- (5) Representatives from communities impacted by aircraft noise or with safety concerns.

Requires the task force to submit a preliminary report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than December 1, 2023, and submit subsequent reports on December 1, 2024, and December 1, 2025.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on June 30, 2026.

SB 3284, SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 179)

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY, TECHNOLOGY SERVICES CONSOLIDATION WORKING GROUP. Establishes a <u>technology services consolidation working group</u>, that shall:

- (1) Develop a plan for the phased consolidation of all state executive branch information technology services and staff, where determined practicable by the working group, within five years, excluding the department of education, Hawaii health systems corporation, University of Hawaii, and office of Hawaiian affairs, under the office of enterprise technology services. The plan shall include:
 - (A) An identification of the specific positions and functions to be transferred in each department;
 - (B) Proposed dates of transfer for each position and function;
 - (C) Proposed information technology facility, personnel, and operational infrastructure needs of the consolidated information technology agency, with projections on future integration needs as additional agencies' information technology staff and services are added;
 - (D) Recommendations to enable the office of enterprise technology services to provide expert support to all state agencies regarding information technology activities in order to meet the needs of the agencies and the public; and
 - (E) Recommendations to ensure that agency services are not interrupted during the phased consolidation; and
- (2) Make recommendations to attract high-quality information technology professionals to the State, including the use of internships, and assess the feasibility of exempting certain positions from the requirements of chapters 76 and 89, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Requires members of the working group to include:

- (1) The <u>chief information officer</u>, who shall serve as chairperson;
- (2) The <u>single executive or the chairperson of the executive board, as the case may be, of each principal executive branch department</u> or that person's designee, <u>excluding the department of education, Hawaii health systems corporation, University of Hawaii, and office of Hawaiian affairs; and</u>
- (3) Any other person that the chief information officer wishes to invite to serve on the working group.

Requires the working group to be administratively attached to the department of accounting and general services. Requires the office of enterprise technology services to provide administrative support to the working group.

Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023, the working group shall submit to the legislature a preliminary status report. Requires this preliminary status report to also include any findings, recommendations, proposed legislation, and funding requirements necessary for the completion of the plan for a phased consolidation of state information technology services.

Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024, the working group shall submit to the legislature a report of its findings and recommendations, including:

(1) The plan for a phased consolidation of state information technology services developed pursuant to this provision, including a detailed five-year phase-in schedule;

- (2) Recommendations to attract high-quality information technology professionals to the State: and
- (3) Any proposed legislation.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on December 31, 2023.

HAWAII RETIREMENT SAVINGS PROGRAM. Provides that prior to implementation of the <u>Hawaii retirement savings program</u>, the <u>Hawaii retirement savings board</u> may conduct a detailed implementation and evaluation study and perform other due diligence tasks to determine the feasibility of the program parameters established by this law and the resources and time needed to implement the program. Provides that upon completion of the study, the board shall report its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation and funding requirements, to the legislature.

Provides that upon submittal of its report to the legislature pursuant to this provision and prior to implementation of the program, the board may determine the level of staffing necessary to implement the program, develop an implementation strategy and timetable, and conduct outreach efforts to potential covered employers and covered employees.

Provides that no later than twenty days before the convening of each regular session, the board shall prepare and submit to the governor and the legislature, and make available to the public, an annual report that shall include but not be limited to:

- (1) The audited financial report prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, detailing the activities, operations, receipts, and expenditures of the program and board during the preceding calendar year; and
- (2) The progress and accomplishments made by the board during the preceding year and projected activities of the program for the current calendar year;

provided that the annual report for the first full fiscal year following program implementation shall include the board's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, relating to the feasibility of expanding the program's eligibility to Hawaii's independent workforce, including self-employed workers.

SHOOTING FACILITIES, HAWAII ISLAND. Establishes within the department of land and natural resources for administrative purposes a <u>working group</u> to:

- (1) Determine basic shooting facility requirements, including the type of shooting venues desired for rifle, pistol, shotgun, air gun, archery, or other shooting sports on the island of Hawaii:
- (2) Construct a preliminary diagram showing all desired shooting venues and the basic support infrastructure required, determine the land size necessary for construction, and incorporate any safety zones required to prevent the escape of projectiles;
- (3) Create and publish a "Shooting Facility Requirements Manual" that incorporates the work of the working group, including a list and description of the desired shooting venues, required infrastructure, and priority of construction;

- (4) Conduct a review of appropriate building sites, elements driving construction, accessibility, gunfire sound propagation, lead management ability, cultural and biological use restrictions, climatology, access to utilities, and vandalism protection;
- (5) Prepare an estimate of design, time-phased construction, and facility operational costs;
- (6) Identify potential sources of revenue; and
- (7) Seek support from potential or identified facility development and operational entities.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>chairperson of the board of land and natural resources</u>, or the chairperson's designee;
- (2) The <u>director of public safety</u>, or the director's designee; and
- (3) Any <u>recreational shooters</u>, <u>hunters</u>, <u>representatives of government agencies</u>, or <u>other representatives</u> deemed necessary by the chairperson of the board of land and natural resources or the director of public safety.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

SB 3311, SD2, HD2

INTERISLAND TRANSPORTATION WORKING GROUP. Establishes an <u>interisland transportation</u> working group within the department of transportation for administrative purposes.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Develop metrics, benchmarks, plans, and recommendations for stakeholders and the legislature to achieve the goals of section 225P-A(a)(2);
- (2) Coordinate with other groups, agencies, and programs in the State and outside of the State that are working to achieve zero emissions transportation; and
- (3) Coordinate with the State and applicable stakeholders to pursue grants and other funding opportunities to achieve the goals of section 225P-A(a)(2).

Requires the working group to comprise the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of transportation</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as cochairperson of the working group;
- (2) The <u>chief energy officer of the Hawaii state energy office</u>, or the chief energy officer's designee, who shall serve as co-chairperson of the working group;
- (4) The co-chairpersons of the commission, or the co-chairpersons' designees:
- (5) The mayor of each county, or the mayor's designee;
- (6) One representative from the airline industry to be selected by the co-chairs;
- (7) One representative from the cruise line industry to be selected by the co-chairs;
- (8) One <u>representative from an entity involved in developing sustainable transportation</u> solutions to be selected by the co-chairs:
- (9) One <u>representative from the Honolulu harbor users group</u> to be selected by the cochairs; and
- (10) Relevant stakeholders, as recommended by the working group.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Submit an annual report to the commission on the working group's activities, progress, and any recommendations to achieve the goals of section 225P-A(a)(2); and
- (2) Submit a report on the progress made and any recommendations to achieve the goals of section 225P-A(a)(2), including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

ELECTRIC VEHICLE SALES GROWTH WORKING GROUP. Establishes an <u>electric vehicle sales</u> growth working group within the department of transportation for administrative purposes.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Develop plans to ensure that the State's electric charging capacity is sufficient to support the growing use of electric vehicles in the State by increasing the State's electric charging capacity at a rate that exceeds the rate by which electric vehicle sales replace internal combustion vehicle sales;
- (2) Allow continued access to high-occupancy vehicle lanes by electric vehicles until electric vehicles constitute at least twenty-five per cent of all new vehicle sales; and
- (3) Develop incentives to further promote the adoption of electric vehicles.

Requires the working group to comprise the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of transportation</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as cochairperson of the working group;
- (2) The <u>chief energy officer of the Hawaii state energy office</u>, or the chief energy officer's designee, who shall serve as co-chairperson of the working group;
- (4) The mayor of each county, or the mayor's designee;
- (5) One <u>representative from an automobile dealers association</u> to be selected by the cochairs:
- (6) One <u>representative from the car and automobile manufacturing industry</u> to be selected by the co-chairs;
- (7) One representative from a public utility to be selected by the co-chairs;
- (8) One representative from an electric vehicle association to be selected by the co-chairs;
- (9) One <u>representative from the ground transportation industry</u> to be selected by the cochairs; and
- (10) Relevant stakeholders, as recommended by the working group.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Submit an annual report to the commission on the working group's activities, progress, and any recommendations related to achieving the objectives pursuant to this provision; and
- (2) Submit a report on the progress made and any recommendations related to achieving the objectives pursuant to this provision, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

SB 3324, SD2, HD2, CD1 (ACT 200)

HOUSING SUBDIVISIONS, INFRASTRUCTURE REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE. Establishes a working group to examine and address housing subdivision infrastructure repair and maintenance for planned housing subdivisions that do not have compulsory homeowner associations in counties with populations greater than one hundred seventy thousand but less than three hundred thousand.

Requires the working group to comprise the following:

- (1) One member of the house of representatives who represents an affected district in the affected county;
- (2) One member of the senate who represents an affected district in the affected county;
- (3) One member of the office of the mayor of an affected county, or designee;
- (4) One member from the Hawaii Council of Community Associations;
- (5) One member from the Hawaii Chapter of the Community Associations Institute;
- (6) One <u>community stakeholder from an affected district</u> to be designated by the senate member on the working group; and
- (7) One <u>community stakeholder from an affected district</u> to be designated by the member of the house of representatives on the working group.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on June 30, 2024.

SB 3330, SD1, HD1, CD1 (ACT 31)

PUPUKEA MARINE LIFE CONSERVATION DISTRICT. Requires the <u>department of land and natural</u> <u>resources</u> to establish and conduct the <u>Pupukea marine life conservation district carrying capacity</u> pilot program to:

- Assess the carrying capacity of certain areas in the Pupukea marine life conservation district;
- (2) Monitor, document, and assess the effectiveness of:
 - (A) Mandatory kapu, or closures, of high-traffic areas in the Pupukea marine life conservation district;
 - (B) Voluntary kapu, or closures, of high-traffic areas in the Pupukea marine life conservation district; and
 - (C) Other restrictions on access to high-traffic areas in the Pupukea marine life conservation district, including the imposition of fees; and
- (3) Propose long-term management options to reduce the impact of humans on the health and abundance of marine life in the sensitive areas of the Pupukea marine life conservation district.

Provides that in establishing and conducting the Pupukea marine life conservation district carrying capacity pilot program, the department of land and natural resources shall consult with the <u>city and county of Honolulu</u>; <u>University of Hawaii</u>, including the <u>Hawaii institute of marine biology</u>; and <u>nonprofit community organizations in the ahupuaa of Pupukea and Waimea</u>.

Requires the Pupukea marine life conservation district carrying capacity pilot program to cease to exist on July 1, 2025.

Requires the department of land and natural resources to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than January 1, 2026.

SB 3367, SD2, HD1, CD1 (ACT 162)

EARLY LUNG CANCER SCREENING. Establishes within the comprehensive cancer control program in the department of health chronic disease prevention and health promotion division an <u>early lung</u> <u>cancer screening task force</u> to research the steps and resources necessary to increase early lung cancer screening in Hawaii.

Requires the task force to consist of:

- (1) A <u>representative from the office of the governor</u>, to be appointed by the governor;
- (2) A representative from the senate, to be appointed by the president of the senate;
- (3) A <u>representative from the house of representatives</u>, to be appointed by the <u>speaker of the house of representatives</u>;
- (4) A representative from the department of health;
- (5) A representative from the department of human services;
- (6) A representative from the University of Hawaii John A. Burns school of medicine;
- (7) A representative from the University of Hawaii cancer center; and
- (8) A <u>representative from each county</u>.

Requires the chairperson of the task force to invite the following individuals to become members of the task force:

- (1) A representative from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs;
- (2) A representative from each health insurer operating in the State, including TRICARE;
- (3) A representative from each health care system operating in the State, including but not limited to The Queen's Health Systems, Hawaii Pacific Health, Kaiser Permanente Hawaii, federally qualified health centers, Native Hawaiian health centers, and Tripler Army Medical Center;
- (4) A representative from the American Lung Association;
- (5) A representative from the American Cancer Society;
- (6) A representative from the Hawaii Primary Care Association;
- (7) At least one <u>representative from an organization representing health care providers with</u> relevant expertise on lung cancer screening; and
- (9) Any <u>other members</u>, including representatives from state agencies, stakeholders, or advocates, as recommended by a majority of the task force.

Requires the task force to submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023.

Requires the task force to submit a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than July 31, 2023. Requires the report to include:

- (1) An analysis of the costs associated with early lung cancer screening;
- (2) A list of qualified facilities in the State that perform lung cancer screenings;
- (3) Protocols for health care providers and health care systems to identify populations at high risk for lung cancer;
- (4) An explanation of how health care providers are made aware of available insurance coverage for early lung cancer screenings;
- (5) Copies of guidelines used by health insurance providers to determine coverage for early lung cancer screening;
- (6) A discussion of cultural and social barriers associated with lung cancer screenings;
- (7) Policy recommendations for increasing early lung cancer screenings; and

(2) A work plan that identifies the steps needed in the next five years to increase lung cancer screenings in the State.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on July 31, 2023.

SB 3369, SD2, HD2, CD1

PROCUREMENT SERVICES CONSOLIDATION WORKING GROUP. Establishes a <u>procurement</u> services consolidation working group, that shall:

- (1) Develop a plan for a five-year phased in consolidation, under the state procurement office, of all state executive branch procurement services and staff, except the Hawaii health systems corporation, University of Hawaii, and office of Hawaiian affairs. The plan shall include:
 - (A) An identification of the specific positions and functions to be transferred from each department to the state procurement office;
 - (B) Proposed dates of transfer for each position and function;
 - (C) Proposed procurement facility, personnel, and operational infrastructure needs of the consolidated procurement agency, with projections on future integration needs as additional agencies' procurement staff and services are added;

- (3) That the information should include visual depictions of the radio frequency emissions in relationship to the physical improvements at the facility, such that any or all visual depictions of the radio frequency emissions can be attributed to a particular antenna or sector at the facility with the latest information;
- (4) Methods and mechanisms for exchanging information about facilities and coordinating communications about the facilities, with respect to a particular facility and with respect to multiple facilities, persons who own or control sites where the facilities are located, contractors performing work on the facilities or at such sites, persons who employ individuals performing work on the facilities or at such sites or hire individuals performing work on the facilities or at such sites, and emergency-services agencies or personnel;
- (5) The ability of authorized persons to access and use the latest available radio frequency emission information in any repository;
- (6) The ability to record by whom and the date on which the information was accessed to ensure compliance with any legal requirements;
- (7) A method to annually audit the site-specific safety information to ensure the accuracy of critical safety information;
- (8) A method that provides insurance to parties affected by radio frequency exposure, including Federal Communications Commission licensees, property owners, employers, and state and local governments, for radio frequency-related injury claims at all wireless antenna sites to minimize exposure to an uninsured risk and potential claims and litigation;
- (9) An independent radio frequency compliance third party to administer and provide services with regard to the proper creation, distribution, access, updates, and management of the information requested in paragraphs (1) through (8), and provide any

- other additional related services as may be deemed necessary by the University of Hawaii:
- (10) Whether to prequalify a prospective third-party radio frequency compliance administrator and service provider for the performance of the services outlined in paragraph (9) and limit a solicitation to those prequalified administrators and service providers;
