FOREWORD

This publication sets forth all of the requests made by the Hawaii State Legislature during the Regular Session of 2024 to agencies and officials of the federal, state and county governments and of quasi-public and private agencies. These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills passed. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature, excluding annual and other reports requested on an indefinite basis. (New, first-year annual reports are included in this publication). These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate or House of Representatives or by both bodies of the Legislature. Certain acts, bills, or resolutions are condensed for brevity. Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

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SB 582 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 10)

HAWAII WILDFIRES; EXPENDITURES. Requires the <u>department of budget and finance</u> and <u>department of human services</u> to submit the following information associated with the Hawaii wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023, to the legislature on the seventh day of each month:

- (1) The date of any expenditures;
- (2) The amounts of any expenditures made, separately, for Federal Emergency Management Agency eligible and Federal Emergency Management Agency ineligible expenses;
- (3) The purpose of the expenditures;
- (4) Any contracts executed for the expenditure of funds;
- (5) The liquidation date for all contracts or liabilities; and
- (6) A detailed explanation of the public purpose served by the expenditure of resources; provided that the <u>governor</u> shall submit to the legislature a summary report containing the aforementioned information for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

ONE OHANA BANK TRUST ACCOUNT. Requires the <u>department of the attorney general</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, which shall include lists of:

- (1) Claims and the amounts paid by the one ohana bank trust account for the calendar year;
- (2) The administrative costs incurred for the one ohana bank trust account for the calendar year; and
- (3) Contributors and their contribution amounts to the one ohana bank trust account received during the calendar year.

MAJOR DISASTER FUND. Requires the <u>administrator of the Hawaii emergency management</u> <u>agency</u> to submit requests to the legislature to appropriate from the general revenues of the State sufficient moneys as may be necessary for expenditure by or under the direction of the governor for immediate relief in response to an emergency or disaster in any part of the State; provided that:

- (1) The governor has issued a proclamation of a state of emergency;
- (2) The governor shall not expend in excess of \$10,000,000 for immediate relief as a result of any single emergency or disaster; and
- (3) In addition to the funds in this provision, an additional \$5,000,000 may be made available solely for the purpose of matching federal disaster relief funds when these funds become available to the State following a presidential disaster declaration.

Requires federal reimbursement moneys for disaster relief for the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023, to be deemed to be trust moneys and shall be deposited into a trust account with and under the control of the Hawaii emergency management agency. Provides that these moneys and any interest earned thereon shall be used for the recovery efforts from the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023, and shall not lapse to the general fund.

Requires the administrator to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than September 1 of each year on:

- (1) The amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State could have applied for during the prior fiscal year. Requires the report to indicate the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response broken down by department and agency;
- (2) The amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State applied for and the amount received during the prior fiscal year. Requires the report to indicate the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response broken down by department and agency;
- (3) The justification for any difference in the amount of federal reimbursement moneys for disaster response that the State was eligible for and the amount the State applied for;
- (4) The average amount of time between the submittal of an application for a Federal Emergency Management Agency reimbursement and receipt of the funds;
- (5) The number of disaster accounts opened for the prior fiscal year; and
- (6) The information relating to the expenditure of funds that is reported by each state department and agency pursuant to this provision.

SB 1511 SD2 HD2 CD2

CONTRACTS FOR SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE RESEARCH CORPORATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII. Provides that for each state project or program involving the <u>research corporation</u>, the university of Hawaii shall notify the exclusive representative of the appropriate bargaining unit to review conformance of positions that are planned to be hired through the research corporation with exceptions to collective bargaining. Prohibits the corporation to supplant civil service employees, and if any programs actively employ civil service employees, the corporation shall provide justification for each civil service employee that will be supplanted with a list of the program affected in its next report to the legislature.

AMENDED LANGUAGE, SUMMARY OF AMENDMENT. Requires any revolving accounts held by the research corporation to follow all laws governing the body and policies established by the corporation. Requires the research corporation to also follow university of Hawaii administrative procedure, AP 12.204, relating to the guidelines and procedures for revolving fund service orders from the university to the research corporation. Provides that within thirty days of the adoption of any amendment to administrative procedure, AP 12.204, by the university of Hawaii and the research corporation, the <u>university of Hawaii</u> shall submit a report to the legislature containing the amended language and a summary of the amendment.

INTERNAL SERVICE ORDERS, REVOLVING ACCOUNTS, FINANCIAL AND MISSION COMPLIANCE. Requires all internal service orders and revolving accounts of the <u>research</u> <u>corporation</u> that involve the use of university of Hawaii intramural funds to be limited to projects relating directly to research and training, including projects in which:

- (1) Much of the operation will lie outside the State; or
- (2) There is a substantial amount of ship operations, technical shop-type operations, computer services, or involvement with other research corporation projects;

and shall be reported no later than June 30 and December 31 of each year to the legislature for financial and mission compliance according to university of Hawaii and research corporation policies. Requires the university of Hawaii and the research corporation to review and approve all revolving accounts on an annual basis.

STATE FIRE COUNCIL, OFFICE OF THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL. Requires the <u>state fire</u> <u>council</u> to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature by November 1, 2024. Requires the report to include the following, at minimum:

- (1) An organizational plan, including structure and personnel plan, for the office of the state fire marshal;
- (2) A description of the roles and division of responsibilities between the State and the counties, and the office of the state fire marshal and the state fire council, regarding fire prevention and response; and
- (3) Proposed operating budget for the office of the state fire marshal.

SB 2257 SD3 HD1 CD1

EDUCATION, HAWAII TEACHER STANDARDS BOARD, SUMMARY REPORT. Provides that in addition to establishing standards for the issuance and renewal of licenses and certificates and any other powers and duties authorized by law, the <u>Hawaii teacher standards board's</u> powers shall also include, among other powers: Submitting an annual report to the governor, the legislature, and the board of education on the board's operations and expenditures, and from the 2007-2008 school year, submitting a summary report every five years of the board's accomplishment of objectives, efforts to improve or maintain teacher quality, and efforts to keep its operations responsive and efficient; and developing criteria for a full career and technical education license, limited to career and technical education teaching assignments, allowing qualified individuals with at least an associate's degree or high school diploma with comparable education and coursework, industry experience, and content expertise to teach.

SB 2284 SD2 HD1 CD1

WILDFIRE FORECAST SYSTEM. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii</u> to establish and implement a two-year program to develop a wildfire forecast system for the State using artificial intelligence. Requires the university of Hawaii to develop the system to forecast the risk of wildfire statewide and thus enhance public safety, preparedness, and risk mitigation, including improving the preparedness of firefighters and enabling residents to take fire mitigation measures for their homes and to plan for evacuations. Requires the university of Hawaii to submit a report on the effectiveness of the program and any findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

SB 2287 SD2 HD1 CD1

OFFICE OF ENTERPRISE TECHNOLOGY SERVICES, CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY STEERING COMMITTEE, REPORT. Requires the <u>chief</u> <u>information officer</u> to present an annual report of the office of enterprise technology services to the information technology steering committee for public comment and shall thereafter, but no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session of the legislature, submit the annual report to the governor and legislature. Requires the annual report to include updates on the activities and programs under the authority of the chief information officer and the information technology steering committee, updates on the hawaii.gov mobile application, and the expenditures of all moneys received from all sources and deposited into the information technology trust account and the shared services technology special fund.

Requires the chief information officer to submit the updated state information technology strategic plan, revised pursuant to this provision, to the governor and the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of every fourth regular session of the legislature; provided that the chief information officer shall submit the first updated state information technology strategic plan to the governor and the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 2021.

SB 2289 SD2 HD2 CD1

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, ANNUAL REPORT. Requires the <u>department of health</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session that addresses the following with regard to Kalaupapa Settlement:

- (1) The department's provision of medical and basic living needs of the patients;
- (2) The department's progress toward defining and addressing the nonmedical needs of patients;
- (3) The department's progress toward promoting a positive living environment;
- (4) The department's management of state resources, including benefits given to employees that are not statutorily defined;
- (5) The department's progress toward establishing written policies and procedures for Kalaupapa store;
- (6) The department's progress toward establishing and maintaining a complaint file and adequately addressing complaints;
- (7) The performance of the administrator, including compliance with job duties;
- (8) The department's progress toward adequate accountability of state property;
- (9) Details and justification of approved employee air travel requests and trail pay;
- (10) Details and updated information, as available, regarding the permanent transfer to other governmental or qualified non-governmental entities of the powers and duties of the department and any other state agency over Kalaupapa Settlement; and
- (11) Details including efforts of engagement by the department with Molokai community groups, including the addition of Ka Ohana O Kalaupapa and a non-governmental organization from the non-peninsular area of Molokai to be selected by the department in consultation with the non-peninsular area of the Molokai community.

SB 2347 HD1 CD1

HABITUAL VIOLENT CRIME, CONVICTIONS. Requires the <u>department of the attorney</u> <u>general</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2025 and 2026 that includes the number of convictions under provisions relating to habitual violent crime, as added by this Act.

Provides that no later than December 1 of 2024 and 2025, the <u>prosecuting attorney of each</u> <u>county</u> shall provide the department of the attorney general with the data to enable the department to complete the report under this provision.

SB 2413 SD2 HD1 CD1

BOARD OF AGRICULTURE, AGRICULTURAL LANDS, LEASES. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025, the <u>board of agriculture</u> shall submit to the legislature a report that includes:

- (1) For each parcel, by tax map key, of agricultural land that is leased by the State pursuant to section 166-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the percentages that are:
 - (A) Suitable for farming; and
 - (B) Actively being farmed; and
- (2) For every lease entered into pursuant to section 166-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, that was transferred by a lessee to another lessee, the dollar amounts of the following:
 - (A) Lease rent;
 - (B) Sum paid by the purchasing lessee for the remainder of the lease; and
 - (C) Amount from the sum paid by the purchasing lessee, pursuant to this provision, that goes to the State.

SB 2512 SD2 HD2 CD1

GOVERNOR, EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT POWERS, EXPENDITURE OR USE OF PUBLIC RESOURCES, NOTICE. Requires the <u>governor</u> to provide notice to the legislature not less than fourteen days before the date of expenditure or use and shall submit a report to the legislature within five days of each exercise of this authority; provided that the report shall include the date of expenditure or use, the amount of the expenditure or use, the program identification from which resources are expended or used, the impacts to the program from which resources are expended or used, and a detailed explanation of the public purpose served by the expenditure or use of the resources; provided further that no later than thirty days prior to the convening of each regular session, the governor shall submit to the legislature a summary report containing the aforementioned information for each exercise of this authority during the preceding twelve-month period from December 1 to November 30.

SB 2516 SD2 HD2 CD1

OFFICE OF ENTERPRISE TECHNOLOGY SERVICES, CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY STEERING COMMITTEE, REPORT. Requires the <u>chief</u> <u>information officer</u> to report to the comptroller and shall, among other responsibilities: Report annually to the governor and the legislature on the status and implementation of the state information technology strategic plan.

Requires the chief information officer to present an annual report of the office of enterprise technology services to the information technology steering committee for public comment and shall thereafter, but no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session of the legislature, submit the annual report to the governor and legislature. Requires the annual report to include updates on the activities and programs under the authority of the chief information officer and the information technology steering committee, and the expenditures of all moneys received from all sources and deposited into the information technology trust account and the shared services technology special fund.

Requires the chief information officer to submit the updated state information technology strategic plan, revised pursuant to this provision, to the governor and the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of every fourth regular session of the legislature; provided that the chief information officer shall submit the first updated state information technology strategic plan to the governor and the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 2021.

SB 2526 SD2 HD2 CD1

TECHNOLOGY SERVICES CONSOLIDATION WORKING GROUP. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2023 and 2025, the <u>technology</u> <u>services consolidation working group</u> shall submit to the legislature a preliminary status report. Requires this preliminary status report to also include any findings, recommendations, proposed legislation, and funding requirements necessary for the completion of the plan for a phased consolidation of state information technology services.

Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2024 and 2026, the working group shall submit to the legislature a report of its findings and recommendations, including:

- (1) The plan for a phased consolidation of state information technology services developed pursuant to this provision, including a detailed five-year phase-in schedule;
- (2) Recommendations to attract high-quality information technology professionals to the State; and
- (3) Any proposed legislation.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on June 30, 2026.

SB 2537 SD2 HD1 CD1

HAWAII CLEAN ENERGY INITIATIVE PROGRAM. Requires the <u>chief energy officer</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session on the status and progress of new and existing clean energy initiatives. Requires the report to also include:

- (1) The spending plan of the Hawaii clean energy initiative program;
- (2) All expenditures of energy security special fund moneys; and
- (3) The targeted markets of the expenditures, including reasons for selecting those markets, the persons to be served, specific objectives of the program, and program expenditures, including measurable outcomes.

STATE SUPPORT FOR ACHIEVING RENEWABLE PORTFOLIO STANDARDS. Requires the chief energy officer to:

- (1) Develop a program to maximize the use of renewable energy and cost-effective conservation measures by state government agencies;
- (2) Work with federal agencies to develop as much research, development and demonstration funding, and technical assistance as possible to support Hawaii in its efforts to achieve its renewable portfolio standards; and
- (3) Biennially, beginning in January 2006, issue a progress report to the governor and legislature.

ENERGY SECURITY SPECIAL FUND, USES. Requires the chief energy officer to submit a report to the legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, on the status and progress of existing programs and activities and the status of new programs and activities funded by the energy security special fund. Requires the report to also include:

- (1) The spending plan of the energy security special fund;
- (2) All expenditures of energy security special fund moneys; and
- (3) The targeted markets of the expenditures, including the reason for selecting those markets; the persons to be served; and the specific objectives of the expenditures, including measurable outcomes.

SB 2659 SD1 HD1 CD1

TOURISM FUNCTIONAL PLAN, UPDATE. Provides that once the <u>Hawaii tourism authority</u> prepares and submits an updated tourism functional plan pursuant to this Act and section 226-56, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the <u>governor</u> shall transmit the approved tourism functional plan to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

(SSCR 2577, 3010, HSCR 1157-24, 1801-24, CCR 88-24)

SB 2706 SD1 HD1

CLEAN SLATE EXPUNGEMENT TASK FORCE. Establishes the <u>clean slate expungement</u> <u>task force</u> to develop a state-initiated record clearing program.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to be composed of one representative from the following entities:

- (1) The <u>judiciary</u>, whose representative shall convene the task force;
- (2) The <u>department of the attorney general;</u>
- (3) The office of Hawaiian affairs;
- (4) The <u>office of the public defender;</u>
- (5) The <u>offices of the prosecuting attorney of the county of Hawaii</u>, <u>county of Maui</u>, <u>city</u> <u>and county of Honolulu</u>, and <u>county of Kauai</u>; and
- (6) The <u>Hawaii innocence project at the university of Hawaii at Manoa William S.</u> <u>Richardson school of law</u>.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to invite one representative from each of the following entities to participate as members of the task force:

- (1) The <u>Hawaii Workers Center;</u>
- (2) The <u>ACLU of Hawaii</u>;
- (3) The <u>Hawaii Friends of Restorative Justice</u>; and
- (4) The Last Prisoner Project.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to invite <u>two directly impacted individuals with</u> <u>lived experience in the criminal legal system</u> to participate as members of the task force.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to seek technical assistance from:

- (1) The <u>Clean State Initiative;</u>
- (2) <u>Code for America;</u> and
- (3) <u>SEARCH System for the Electronic Analysis and Retrieval of Criminal Histories</u>.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2025 and 2026. Requires the clean slate expungement task force to submit a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

Requires the clean slate expungement task force to be dissolved on June 1, 2027.

SB 2726 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 43)

CONDOMINIUMS STUDY, LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU. Requires the <u>legislative</u> <u>reference bureau</u> to study and submit a report on the approaches employed by certain other states regarding the following condominium subjects:

- (1) A condominium ombudsman or similar position to specifically oversee condominiums;
- (2) Required licenses for individuals involved in the management of condominiums;
- (3) The availability of dedicated alternative dispute resolution or similar programs that are specifically for the prevention or resolution of condominium-related disputes and are separate from alternative dispute resolution programs available for other disputes;
- (4) Governmental regulation and enforcement of condominium operations and governance that are separate from an ombudsman referenced in this provision;
- (5) Requirements for owner education at the point of sale of a unit; and
- (6) Requirements for owner access to condominium documents.

Provides that to the extent feasible, each subject shall include:

- (1) Descriptive information detailing the approach of each jurisdiction;
- (2) Identified strengths and weaknesses of each particular approach; and
- (3) Identified best practices in the jurisdiction.

Requires the jurisdictions to be studied to be:

- (1) California;
- (2) Delaware;
- (3) Florida;
- (4) Massachusetts;
- (5) Nevada; and
- (6) Any other jurisdiction deemed relevant by the legislative reference bureau.

Requires the legislative reference bureau to submit the report to the legislature and the condominium property regime task force no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

CONDOMINIUM PROPERTY REGIME TASK FORCE. Requires the <u>condominium property</u> <u>regime task force</u> to submit a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than June 30, 2026.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on June 30, 2026.

SB 2943 SD2 HD1 CD1

COMMERCIAL DRIVERS WORKFORCE WORKING GROUP. Establishes a <u>commercial</u> <u>drivers workforce working group</u> within the <u>department of transportation</u>. Requires the working group to:

- (1) Engage the public and private sectors to increase awareness of the ground transportation industry and the industry's workforce needs; and
- (2) Collaborate with key stakeholders to identify and develop possible career paths for qualified commercial drivers, prioritizing filling vacancies within the department of education, with the ultimate goal of filling vacancies within the private and public sectors.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of transportation</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as the cochair of the working group;
- (2) <u>One member from the department of education workforce development branch</u>, who shall serve as the co-chair of the working group;
- (3) A <u>campus coordinator from the office of workforce development at the university of</u> <u>Hawaii community colleges who is in charge of a workforce development program that</u> <u>includes commercial driver's license training;</u>
- (4) <u>One member from the department of labor and industrial relations workforce</u> <u>development council;</u>
- (5) One member from each county's commercial driver's licensing office; and
- (6) <u>One member from each county's workforce development board.</u>

Requires the director of transportation to invite representatives from the following organizations to serve as members of the working group:

- (1) <u>Two members representing the Hawaii Transportation Association;</u>
- (2) <u>One member representing the labor union representing commercial driver's license</u> holders; and
- (3) <u>One member representing a local non-profit organization currently providing</u> <u>commercial driver's license training</u>.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to address the shortage of commercial drivers in the State, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

Requires the working group to cease to exist on June 30, 2025.

SB 2974 SD2 HD1 CD1

BUSINESS REVITALIZATION TASK FORCE. Establishes a <u>business revitalization task force</u> within the <u>department of business</u>, economic development, and tourism for administrative purposes.

Requires the task force to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of business, economic development, and tourism</u> or the director's designee;
- (2) The director of commerce and consumer affairs or the director's designee;
- (3) The <u>director of taxation</u> or the director's designee;
- (4) The <u>director of labor and industrial relations</u> or the director's designee;
- (5) A <u>member of the small business regulatory review board</u>, to be appointed by the chair of the board;
- (6) The <u>dean of the university of Hawaii at Manoa Shidler college of business</u> or the dean's designee; and
- (7) The <u>director of each county agency with jurisdiction over economic development</u> or each respective director's designee.

Allows the <u>chair of the house of representatives standing committee with primary jurisdiction</u> <u>over economic development</u> and the <u>chair of the senate standing committee with primary</u> <u>jurisdiction over economic development</u> to invite one person from each of the following entities to join the task force:

- (1) <u>One representative of the construction industry;</u>
- (2) <u>One representative of the agriculture industry;</u>
- (3) <u>One representative of the visitor industry;</u>
- (4) <u>One representative of the food industry;</u>
- (5) <u>One representative of the retail industry;</u>
- (6) <u>One representative of the high technology industry;</u>
- (7) One representative of the regional and ethnic chambers of commerce; and
- (8) One representative from the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii.

Requires the task force to select a chairperson from among the members listed in this provision and a vice chairperson from among any of its members.

Requires local business community members of the task force to serve without compensation.

Requires the task force to:

- (1) Identify methods to improve Hawaii's general economic competitiveness and business climate, including the mitigation of regulatory and tax burdens;
- (2) Develop and recommend legislation to increase Hawaii's general economic competitiveness; and
- (3) Develop recommendations for improving governmental operations and reducing costs.

Requires staff to assist the task force in performing its duties to be assigned by the department of business, economic development, and tourism or the <u>president of the senate</u>, <u>speaker of the house of representatives</u>, and <u>governor</u>.

Provides that in performing its duties as required by this provision, the task force shall consider reports issued by the auditor; state ethics commission; department of business, economic development, and tourism; and university of Hawaii economic research organization and any other relevant reports.

Requires the task force to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026; provided that the task force may submit all or parts of its recommendations to the legislature prior to the submission of its report.

Requires the task force to be dissolved on June 30, 2026.

HAWAII LABOR RELATIONS BOARD, COLLECTIVE BARGAINING, NEW UNIT. Provides that upon making a determination of whether or not to approve a petition to establish a new bargaining unit, the <u>Hawaii labor relations board</u> shall issue a decision and order.

Provides that if the petition is approved, the board shall submit a report to the legislature, including proposed legislation for the legislature to consider and enact the establishment of the new bargaining unit, which shall be accompanied by the decision and order issued by the board.

STATE RISK MANAGEMENT REVOLVING FUND, MAUI WILDFIRES. Appropriates out of the state risk management revolving fund established by section 41D-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$200,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for insurance claim payments related to the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023; provided that the <u>department of accounting and general services</u> shall submit to the legislature, on the seventh day of each month, the following information associated with the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023:

- (1) The date of insurance proceeds allocation;
- (2) The amount of proceeds allocated;
- (3) The date of each expenditure;
- (4) The amount of each expenditure;
- (5) The purpose of each expenditure;
- (6) Any contracts executed for the expenditure of funds;
- (7) All liquidation dates for contracts or liabilities; and
- (8) A detailed explanation of the public purposes served by the expenditure of resources.

Provides that notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the <u>governor</u> shall submit to the legislature, no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025, a summary report containing the aforementioned information for the previous twelve-month period from December 1 to November 30.

Requires the sum appropriated to be expended by the department of accounting and general services, state risk management and insurance administration (AGS 203), for the purposes of this provision, with the approval of the comptroller.

RECOVERY COSTS, MAUI WILDFIRES. Appropriates out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$186,160,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 as a set-aside for recovery costs for the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023; provided that notwithstanding any law to the contrary the governor may authorize the transfer of up to \$186,160,000 in general funds to other state agencies for recovery costs for the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023; provided further that began on August 8, 2023; provided further that the governor shall provide notice to the legislature fourteen days prior to the date of any transfer and submit a report to the legislature within five days of each use of this authority; provided further that the report shall include the date of transfer, the amount of the transfer, the program ID to which funds were transferred, and an explanation of the purpose of the transfer of resources.

Provides that notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the <u>governor</u> shall submit to the legislature, no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2025 and 2026, a summary report containing the aforementioned information for each use of this authority for the previous twelve-month period from December 1 to November 30.

Requires the sum appropriated to be expended by the department of budget and finance, departmental administration and budget division (BUF 101), for the purposes of this Act.

EXPENDITURES, MAUI WILDFIRES. Provides that notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the <u>department of budget and finance</u> or <u>any department or agency receiving funds transferred</u> <u>by the governor under this Act</u> shall submit to the legislature, on the seventh day of each month, the following information associated with the Maui wildfires disaster that began on August 8, 2023:

- (1) The date of each expenditure;
- (2) The amount of each expenditure, for expenses that are Federal Emergency Management Agency eligible; and separately, for expenses that are Federal Emergency Management Agency ineligible;
- (3) The purpose of expenditures;
- (4) Any contracts executed for the expenditure of funds;
- (5) All liquidation dates for contracts or liabilities; and
- (6) A detailed explanation of the public purposes served by the expenditure of resources.

Provides that notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the <u>governor</u> shall submit to the legislature, no later than thirty days prior to the convening to the regular session of 2025, a summary report containing the aforementioned information for the previous twelve-month period from December 1 to November 30.

PROGRAM APPROPRIATION PROVISIONS, HURRICANE DORA, DROUGHT RESILIENCY, WILDFIRE RISK. Provides that of the general fund appropriation for the Hawaii association of conservation districts (LNR141), the sum of \$400,000 or so much thereof as is necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 shall be expended in accordance with chapter 180, Hawaii Revised Statutes, in areas affected by Hurricane Dora in 2023; provided further that:

- (1) The moneys shall be used to match extramural funding for stormwater management for drought resiliency and reducing wildfire risk;
- (2) No later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025, the <u>department of land and natural resources</u> shall submit a report to the legislature accounting for the usage of funds; and
- (3) These funds are deemed necessary to qualify for federal aid financing or reimbursement.

PEER SUPPORT SPECIALIST WORKING GROUP. Establishes within the <u>office of wellness</u> <u>and resilience</u> for administrative purposes a peer support specialist working group. Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of the office of wellness and resilience</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as the chairperson of the working group;
- (2) The <u>director of health</u>, or the director's designee;
- (3) The <u>superintendent of education</u>, or the superintendent's designee;
- (4) The <u>director of law enforcement</u>, or the director's designee;
- (5) A member of the Hawaii state judiciary, to be appointed by the chief justice;

- (6) A <u>member of the department of health's adult mental health division representing the</u> <u>administrator of the Hawaii certified peer specialist program;</u>
- (7) A member of the department of health's child and adolescent mental health division representing the administrator of the peer support specialist program carried out within the division;
- (8) The <u>administrator of med-QUEST</u>, or the administrator's designee;
- (9) The <u>governor's coordinator on homelessness</u>, or the coordinator's designee;
- (10) <u>Two members of the nonprofit sector</u>, who shall be invited by the chairperson; and
- (11) A <u>member from each of the following constituencies</u>, whom the chairperson shall invite to participate in the working group;
 - (A) An individual with lived experience as a child or youth in the child welfare system;
 - (B) An <u>individual with lived experience in the juvenile justice system or an individual</u> with lived experience in the adult correctional system;
 - (C) <u>Two caregivers with lived experience as the caregiver of a child or youth in the behavioral health, child welfare, or juvenile justice systems;</u>
 - (D) An individual with lived experience with recovery from substance abuse and lived experience being homeless; and
 - (E) An individual with lived experience navigating the mental health system either as a child or youth or as an adult.

Requires the working group to develop and make recommendations for a framework for peer support specialists in the State. Requires the working group to:

- (1) Identify best practices and create, develop, and adopt a statewide framework for peer support specialists. Requires the framework to include:
 - (A) Clear roles and definitions of peer support specialists, youth peer support specialists, adult peer support specialists, and caregiver peer support specialists;
 - (B) Ethics, values, and standards required of peer support specialists;
 - (C) Recommendations on whether the State should require youth peer support specialists, adult peer support specialists, and caregiver peer support specialists to undertake the same training, certification, and credentialing process or whether the training should be individualized based on the type of peer support;
 - (D) Recommendations on how to require peer support specialists in state-awarded contracts; and
 - (E) An implementation and quality improvement plan, consisting of an evaluation plan with coordinated data collection and suggested metrics for assessing ongoing progress of the framework;
- (2) Identify a trauma-informed model of supervision of peer support specialists to support competent and ethical delivery of services that support continued development of peer support specialist abilities and support navigation of state systems, including the certification and credentialing process, integration in decision making and program development processes, debriefing from meetings, training and technical assistance, and programs to support the well-being of peer support specialists;
- (3) Provide an inventory of current use of peer support specialists within and across public and private agencies and departments; and
- (4) Develop a sustainability plan that includes identification of federal and state funding streams to incorporate requirements to establish peer support as a medicaid billable service.

Allows the office of wellness and resilience to contract with an <u>administrative facilitator</u> to provide necessary support for the peer support specialist working group in carrying out its duties.

Requires the peer support specialist working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

Requires the peer support specialist working group to cease to exist on June 30, 2025.

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE, WORKING GROUP. Requires the <u>disability and</u> <u>communication access board</u> to convene a working group to:

- (1) Study the state of American Sign Language interpretation services in Hawaii; and
- (2) Investigate and study any means, methods, processes, or systems that might improve the provision of American Sign Language interpretation services in the State.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) A <u>representative from the disability and communication access board</u>, who shall serve as chairperson of the working group;
- (2) A <u>representative from the department of human services division of vocational</u> <u>rehabilitation;</u>
- (3) A <u>representative from the department of education;</u>
- (4) A professor from the university of Hawaii who teaches American Sign Language;
- (5) A member of the deaf and blind task force;
- (6) An <u>individual who currently serves as an American Sign Language interpreter</u>, who shall be invited by the chairperson of the working group; and
- (7) <u>Any additional members</u> deemed necessary by the chairperson of the working group.

Requires the working group, with the assistance of the <u>department of health</u>, to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than December 31, 2024.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on June 30, 2025.

HAWAII TOURISM AUTHORITY, ANNUAL REPORT. Requires the <u>Hawaii tourism authority</u> to submit a complete and detailed report of its activities, expenditures, and results, including the progress of the strategic tourism management plan developed pursuant to section 201B-6, toward achieving the authority's strategic plan goals, to the governor and legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session of the legislature. Requires the annual report to include the descriptions and evaluations of programs funded, together with any recommendations by the authority.

HB 1595 HD1 SD1

EXPUNGEMENT, MARIJUANA, PILOT PROJECT. Requires the <u>department of the attorney</u> <u>general</u> to establish and administer a pilot project beginning on the effective date of this Act and ending on October 1, 2025, for a state-initiated project to expunge certain arrest records relating to the offense under section 712-1249, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for possessing marijuana. Provides that for purposes of this pilot project, the department of the attorney general shall utilize the existing funding and resources of the Hawaii criminal justice data center.

Requires the <u>Hawaii criminal justice data center</u> to submit a report to the legislature regarding the progress of the pilot project, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2025 and 2026, that shall include the following:

- (1) The total number of records identified to date as potentially eligible for expungement;
- (2) The total number of expungement orders granted to date by the department of the attorney general;
- (3) The total time and resources expended by the Hawaii criminal justice data center to date on the pilot project; and
- (4) With respect to the report due to the legislature twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026, any future recommendations, including a statement of required resources and appropriations concerning state-initiated expungements.

Allows the department of the attorney general to seek assistance from the <u>university of Hawaii</u> <u>at Manoa William S. Richardson school of law</u> or the <u>Hawaii Innocence Project's Beyond Guilt</u> <u>Hawaii Clinic</u> to carry out the purpose of this Act.

HB 1760 HD1 SD1 CD1 (ACT 35)

RENTAL HOUSING REVOLVING FUND. Requires the <u>Hawaii housing finance and</u> <u>development corporation</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session describing the projects funded and, with respect to rental housing projects targeted for persons and families with incomes at or below thirty per cent of the median family income, its efforts to develop those rental housing projects, a description of proposals submitted for this target group and action taken on the proposals, and any barriers to developing housing units for this target group.

Provides that for the period commencing July 1, 2005, through June 30, 2009, the fund may be used to provide grants for rental units set aside for persons and families with incomes at or below thirty per cent of the median family income in any project financed in whole or in part by the fund in proportion of those units to the total number of units in the project. Provides that at the conclusion of the period described in this provision, the corporation shall report to the legislature on the number and use of grants provided and whether the grants were an effective use of the funds for purposes of developing rental housing for families at or below thirty per cent of the median family income.

RENTAL HOUSING REVOLVING FUND. Requires the Hawaii housing finance and <u>development corporation</u> to submit a report to the legislature on plans to revolve funds back into the rental housing revolving fund to ensure its self-sufficiency no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

Part III of Act 164, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, Section 5.1

PROGRAM APPROPRIATION PROVISIONS, UTILITIES. Provides that for appropriations contained in this Act, which are expended on utilities including water, sewer, electricity, and telecommunications, the <u>expending department</u> shall provide a written report detailing the department's plan(s) to decrease costs of these utilities, provided further that this report shall be drafted in reference to section 196-1(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes, for such utilities; and provided further that these reports shall be submitted to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

Part III of Act 164, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, Section 5.2

PROGRAM APPROPRIATION PROVISIONS, POSITIONS. Provides that for positions that are appropriated in this Act, the <u>department of budget and finance</u> (BUF101) shall determine the amount of appropriated funds dedicated to vacant positions; and provided further that this report shall be submitted to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

HB 1911 HD2 SD2 CD1

JUDICIARY SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT OF 2024. Provides that if any manifest clerical, typographical, or other mechanical error is found in this Act, the <u>chief justice</u> may correct the error. Requires all changes made pursuant to this section to be reported to the legislature at its next regular session.

HB 1925 HD2 SD1 CD1 (ACT 36)

HAWAII STATE PLANNING ACT PHASE II TASK FORCE. Establishes the Hawaii State Planning Act phase II task force to be placed within the <u>office of planning and sustainable</u> <u>development</u> for administrative purposes only.

Requires the task force to:

- (1) Create a two-year plan to examine the issues established in this provision, clarify and articulate findings, develop metrics and benchmarks to measure progress, and develop a final report that describes how the State is addressing the findings set forth in the phase I update completed in 2018;
- (2) Incorporate into the plan how it will coordinate with other groups, agencies, and programs within and outside the State to achieve alignment of plans and their implementation;

- (3) Incorporate into the plan how it will coordinate with the counties to achieve alignment of plans and their implementation; and
- (4) Consider and incorporate into the plan equity concerns, including economic and accessibility impacts to low-income communities.

Requires the task force to be composed of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director of the office of planning and sustainable development</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as chairperson;
- (2) The superintendent of education, or the superintendent's designee;
- (3) The <u>chairperson of the board of trustees of the office of Hawaiian affairs</u>, or the chairperson's designee;
- (4) A representative from the university of Hawaii economic research organization;
- (5) <u>Co-chairs of the Hawaii climate change mitigation and adaptation commission</u>, or their designees;
- (6) The <u>planning director of each county</u>, or their respective designees;
- (7) The <u>chairperson of each county economic development board</u>, or their respective designees; and
- (8) <u>Other relevant stakeholders</u>, to include <u>non-profit</u>, <u>academia</u>, <u>business</u>, and <u>Native</u> <u>Hawaiian representatives</u>, to be invited by the task force and its chairperson.

Requires the task force to submit annual reports of the task force's progress, completed actions, and findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on June 30, 2027.

PENAL CODE REVIEW, JUDICIAL COUNCIL. Requires the <u>judicial council</u>, as established pursuant to section 601-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, through an advisory committee on penal code review, to conduct a comprehensive review of the Hawaii Penal Code and recommend to the legislature necessary amendments to ensure:

- (1) That the Hawaii Penal Code is consistent and proportional across the various types and classes of offenses;
- (2) That the Hawaii Penal Code is aligned with national best practices and based upon evidence-based strategies;
- (3) That grades and punishment are appropriate and proportionate to other sentences imposed for criminal or civil offenses and are cost-effective in deterring crime, reducing recidivism, and providing restitution to victims in a manner that provides equal justice and punishment regardless of socioeconomic class or ethnicity;
- (4) That the response of the criminal justice system to mentally ill offenders is appropriate to the situation; and
- (5) The continued force, effectiveness, and enforcement of the Hawaii Penal Code.

Provides that no later than September 1, 2024, the judicial council shall appoint an advisory committee on penal code review. Requires the advisory committee to include the following members:

- (1) Representatives of the judiciary;
- (2) A member of the senate standing committee on judiciary;
- (3) A <u>member of the house of representatives standing committee on judiciary and</u> <u>Hawaiian affairs;</u>
- (4) The <u>attorney general</u>, or the attorney general's designee;
- (5) A representative of the office of the public defender;
- (6) The <u>administrator of the office of Hawaiian affairs</u>, or the administrator's designee;
- (7) A representative of the department of corrections and rehabilitation;
- (8) A representative of the department of law enforcement;
- (9) The governor's senior advisor for mental health and the justice system;
- (10) The prosecuting attorney of each county, or each prosecuting attorney's designee; and
- (11) A <u>representative of the police department of each county, at least one of which shall</u> <u>be in a role that focuses on mental health</u>.

Requires the following members to be invited by the judicial council to participate on the advisory committee:

- (1) <u>Representatives from citizen participation bodies, such as neighborhood boards;</u>
- (2) <u>Private citizens interested in criminal law and civil liberties;</u>
- (3) <u>Hawaii-licensed attorneys in private practice who handle criminal cases;</u>
- (4) Representatives from advocacy groups for incarcerated individuals;
- (5) <u>Representatives from advocacy groups for crime victims;</u>
- (6) <u>Psychologists or social workers;</u> and
- (7) Any <u>other members</u> the judicial council deems necessary.

Requires the advisory committee to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

Allows the judicial council to appoint a reporter for the review and other research and clerical staff, as may be necessary, without regard to chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Provides that in selecting the reporter and research and clerical staff, the judicial council is urged to use, to the greatest extent possible, the <u>faculty and students of the university of Hawaii at Manoa</u> <u>William S. Richardson school of law</u>.

LONG-TERM CARE PLAN. Requires the <u>executive office on aging</u> to coordinate with the <u>state</u> <u>health planning and development agency</u> in the development of a long-term care plan as part of an overall health care system plan.

Requires the executive office on aging, in coordination with the state health planning and development agency, to establish a comprehensive long-term care plan to:

- Identify essential components to ensure the availability of a full continuum of long-term care services, including homes, skilled nursing institutions, and other institutional and community-based services;
- (2) Identify needed reforms to establish a sustainable long-term care system;

- (3) Research programmatic changes and resources necessary to meet the State's longterm care public policy goals; and
- (4) Explore funding options to support the provision of long-term care services, including the recruitment, training, and retention of a skilled workforce.

Requires the executive office on aging to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

BEACH MANAGEMENT, NORTH SHORE, OAHU. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii sea grant</u> <u>college program</u> to develop a comprehensive, actionable beach management plan for the area of the north shore of Oahu from Sunset point to Kapo'o (Sharks Cove).

Provides that in developing the beach management plan, the university of Hawaii sea grant college program shall ensure the inclusion of diverse community input. Requires the plan to consider innovative means to address beach erosion and the erosion of private beachfront property, protection of recreational access, and preservation of natural beauty and vistas.

Requires the university of Hawaii sea grant college program to submit the north shore beach management plan to the governor and legislature by December 1, 2025.

HB 2354 HD1 SD2 CD1

SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY REVIEW BOARD. Allows the <u>small business regulatory</u> <u>review board</u> to also consider any request from small business owners for review of any rule proposed, amended, or adopted by a state agency or for review of any legislation affecting small businesses, and to make recommendations to the agency or the legislature regarding the need for a rule change or legislation. Provides that for requests regarding county rules, the board may make recommendations to the county council or the mayor for appropriate action.

Requires the board to submit an annual report to the legislature twenty days prior to each regular session detailing any requests from small business owners for review of any rule proposed, amended, or adopted by a state agency or for review of any legislation affecting small businesses, and any recommendations made by the board to an agency or the legislature regarding the need for a rule change or legislation. Requires the report to also contain a summary of the comments made by the board to agencies regarding its review of proposed new or amended rules.

HAWAII INTERAGENCY COUNCIL FOR TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT. Requires the Hawaii interagency council for transit-oriented development to be composed of the following members:

- (1) <u>Director of the office of planning and sustainable development</u>, who shall serve as cochair;
- (2) <u>Executive director of the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation</u>, who shall serve as co-chair;

- (6) Identify potential regulatory or statutory changes, including any changes needed to resolve existing legal ambiguities or inconsistencies as well as potential legal procedures for facilitating individual efforts;
- (7) Consult with <u>representatives of business and organized labor</u>, <u>members of the Legislature</u>, <u>representatives of county governments</u>, <u>community groups</u>, and <u>other agencies</u> concerning the activities of the task force and its members and ways of improving its effectiveness, including whether to establish an advisory panel under the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations;
- (8) Submit an annual report, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each Regular Session, to the <u>Governor</u>, <u>Legislature</u>, <u>mayor of each county</u>, and <u>chairperson</u> <u>of each county council</u> that summarizes the task force's activities during the year; provided that the annual report:
 - (A) Describes the task force's efforts and accomplishments during the year;
 - (B) Identifies any administrative or legal barriers that impede the more effective operation of the task force, including any barriers to information-sharing or joint action;

- (C) Proposes, after consultation with representatives of business and organized labor, members of the Legislature, representatives of county governments, community groups, and other agencies, the appropriate administrative, legislative, or regulatory changes to strengthen the task force's operations and to reduce or eliminate any barriers to those efforts; and
- (D) Identifies successful preventive mechanisms to reduce the extent of the underground economy and employee misclassification in the construction industry; and
- (9) Take appropriate steps to publicize its activities.

Resolves that to the extent permitted by law, <u>every agency within the State's and each county's</u> <u>executive branch</u> is requested to make all reasonable efforts to cooperate with the Underground Economy Interagency Task Force and to furnish any information and assistance as the task force reasonably deems necessary to accomplish its purposes.
