FOREWORD

This publication sets forth all of the requests made by the Hawaii State Legislature during the Regular Session of 2025 to agencies and officials of the federal, state and county governments and of quasi-public and private agencies. These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills passed. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature, excluding annual and other reports requested on an indefinite basis. (New, first-year annual reports are included in this publication). These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate or House of Representatives or by both bodies of the Legislature. Certain acts, bills, or resolutions are condensed for brevity. Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

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SB 104 SD2 HD3 CD1

RESTRICTED HOUSING WORKING GROUP; CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES. Provides that beginning July 1, 2026, the use of restrictive housing in correctional facilities shall be permitted only under limited circumstances. Provides that within twelve hours of a decision to extend a facility-wide lockdown beyond twenty-four hours, the <u>director or deputy director of the</u> <u>department of corrections and rehabilitation</u> shall publish the foregoing reasons on the department's website and shall provide meaningful notice to the legislature of the reasons for the lockdown.

Requires a restrictive housing legislative working group to be convened by August 1, 2025, to:

- (1) Review, consider, and identify laws, policies, and procedures regarding restrictive housing for members of vulnerable populations including committed persons who:
 - (A) Are sixty years of age or older;
 - (B) Have a physical or mental disability, a history of psychiatric hospitalization, or recently exhibited conduct, including serious self-mutilation, that indicates the need for further observation or evaluation to determine the presence of mental illness;
 - (C) Have a developmental disability, as defined in section 333F-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
 - (D) Have a serious medical condition that cannot be effectively treated while the committed person is in restrictive housing;
 - (E) Have a significant auditory or visual impairment; or
 - (F) Is perceived to be lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex; and
- (2) By January 8, 2027, make recommendations to the legislature regarding more comprehensive laws, policies, and procedures regarding restrictive housing for members of vulnerable populations.

Requires the restrictive housing legislative working group to consist of the following members, or their designees:

- (1) The <u>chairperson of the house of representatives standing committee with primary</u> jurisdiction over corrections and rehabilitation, who shall serve as co-chairperson;
- (2) The <u>chairperson of the senate standing committee with primary jurisdiction over</u> corrections and rehabilitation, who shall serve as co-chairperson;
- (3) The director of corrections and rehabilitation;
- (4) The senior advisor for mental health and the justice system in the office of the governor; and
- (5) A commissioner on the Hawaii correctional system oversight commission.

Requires the co-chairpersons of the working group to invite the following individuals to serve as members of the working group:

- (1) A representative of the office of Hawaiian affairs;
- (2) A representative from the American Civil Liberties Union of Hawaii;
- (3) A representative from the Community Alliance on Prisons; and
- (4) <u>Any other individuals</u> identified by the chairpersons of the working group.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on January 8, 2027, or upon submission of its final report to the legislature, whichever is later.

Allows the department of corrections and rehabilitation to implement, if practicable by December 1, 2027, recommended policies and procedures of the restrictive housing legislative working group regarding the placement of committed persons who are members of certain vulnerable populations into restrictive housing and develop transition and service plans for these committed persons in restrictive housing.

Provides that no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027, the department of corrections and rehabilitation shall submit to the legislature and Hawaii correctional system oversight commission interim reports of the department's progress toward full compliance with this Act, along with draft copies of written policies and procedures implemented pursuant to this Act.

Provides that no later than January 12, 2028, the department of corrections and rehabilitation shall submit to the legislature and Hawaii correctional system oversight commission a final report of the department's progress toward full compliance with this Act and implementing any recommendations in the final report of the restrictive housing legislative working group.

ILLEGAL FIREWORKS TASK FORCE. Requires the <u>illegal fireworks task force</u> to submit an interim report on the status of its comprehensive strategic plan, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each of the regular sessions of 2024, 2025, 2026, 2027, 2028, and 2029. Requires the task force to submit a final report of its comprehensive strategic plan, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty the task force to submit a final report of its comprehensive strategic plan, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2030.

SB 223 SD2 HD1 CD1

FIRE PREVENTION; COMMUNITY FUELS REDUCTION PROJECT. Requires the <u>department</u> <u>of land and natural resources</u> to establish and implement a community fuels reduction project to reduce hazardous wildfire fuels on state lands, particularly on lands adjacent to communities. Requires where feasible, the community fuels reduction project to:

- Reduce hazardous wildfire fuels on the landscape that threaten watersheds, communities, and critical public infrastructure such as powerlines and communication facilities;
- (2) Create and maintain effective firebreaks along undeveloped state properties that border a developed parcel, including but not limited to schools and residential and commercial properties, by removing and clearing flammable vegetation and combustible growth from areas within thirty feet of the developed parcel;
- (3) Reduce flammable grasses on the landscape through projects like managed grazing; and
- (4) Provide water infrastructure for grazing and fire suppression.

Requires the department of land and natural resources to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session detailing the progress made toward meeting the requirements of this provision.

SB 383 SD2 HD1 CD1

SMALL PURCHASE PROCUREMENTS; MINIMUM THRESHOLD. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026, the <u>state procurement office</u> shall submit to the legislature a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, on the efficacy of the amendment to section 103D-305, Hawaii Revised Statutes, made by this Act.

SB 447 HD1 CD1

HIRING PILOT PROGRAM. Establishes a hiring pilot program within the <u>department of</u> <u>health</u>. Requires the pilot program to include the following:

- (1) For delegated position classifications, the department of health may forward to the hiring program applications received without verifying minimum qualifications. Provides that when the hiring program selects an applicant for hire, the <u>human resources office of the department of health</u> shall verify the applicant's minimum qualifications before extending an offer of employment. Requires the <u>department of human resources development</u> to approve the temporary delegation of other unique position classifications and non-unique position classifications that are requested by the department of health for recruitment under the pilot program;
- (2) The department of health shall have the following flexibilities regarding minimum qualifications for positions having a salary range at or below SR-10:
 - (A) Considering required minimum qualifications as desired qualifications; and
 - (B) Allowing certain community college development programs to be substituted for required or desired experience;

provided that the department of health shall specify any minimum qualification requirement or substitute in the recruitment posting;

- (3) The department of health may directly hire an individual who meets minimum qualifications into a civil service position; provided that there are more than five vacant positions within the department of health for that position classification; and
- (4) The director of health may make a temporary appointment outside the list at what would be the merited civil service pay scale without step limitation; provided that the department of health shall notify the department of human resources development of all temporary appointments outside the list made under this provision. Provides that as used in this provision, a "temporary appointment outside the list" means a non-civil service temporary appointment outside the list as described in policy number 300.001 of the department of human resources development policies and procedures, titled types of appointments.

Requires the pilot program established under this provision to be available for department of health recruitments that are initiated before July 1, 2028.

Requires the department of health to submit a report to the legislature of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation regarding the pilot program established by this Act, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026, 2027, 2028, and 2029.

SB 465 SD1 HD1 CD1

CARRYING CAPACITY STUDY; KIKIAOLA SMALL BOAT HARBOR; KAUAI. Requires the <u>department of land and natural resources</u> to conduct a carrying capacity study of Kikiaola small boat harbor in the county of Kauai. Requires the study to:

- (1) Include an assessment of the carrying capacity of the Kikiaola small boat harbor and its surrounding area, including an estimate of the number of persons and the amount of human activity that the harbor can sustain without degrading natural resources, cultural resources, or experiences by visitors and residents; provided that the carrying capacity assessed shall include the capacity effects of any improvements that have been approved as of the effective date of this Act, including the construction of a second boat launch ramp;
- (2) Assess the effectiveness of existing use restrictions and management practices;
- (3) Determine whether commercial tour operators have been allowed by the department to increase the number of passengers allowed in their operations without review or understanding of the effects on the harbor's infrastructure or natural resources;
- (4) Assess the potential effectiveness of visitor use restrictions and management practices; and
- (5) Propose long-term management options to reduce the impact of humans on the health and abundance of natural resources, cultural resources, and native species within and around the harbor.

Provides that in conducting the study, the department of land and natural resources shall consult with the <u>county of Kauai</u>, <u>relevant community organizations</u>, and <u>other relevant entities</u>.

Requires the department of land and natural resources to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

SB 576 SD1 HD2 CD1 (ACT 155)

HOUSING; FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION; LEGISLATIVE REPORTS. Requires the <u>Hawaii</u> <u>Housing Finance and Development Corporation</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature on all corporation program areas and funds organized by program area, and by fund within each program area, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, which shall provide the following information on the status of its programs and finances:

(1) A description of programs being developed in the current fiscal biennium, including a summary listing of the programs, the status of each program, the methods of project financing or loans, and other information deemed significant;

- (2) A description of programs planned for development during the two ensuing fiscal bienniums, including a summary listing of the proposed programs, the methods of project financing or loans, and other information deemed significant;
- (3) A status report of actual expenditures made in the prior completed fiscal year from each fund and agent established under this law, estimated expenditures anticipated for the current fiscal year, and projected expenditures for the ensuing fiscal years to be described in relation to specific projects developed to implement the purposes of any program, fund, or agent established under this law;
- (4) A financial audit and report conducted on an annual basis by a <u>certified public</u> <u>accounting firm;</u> and
- (5) Recommendations with reference to any additional legislation or other action that may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this law.

Requires the Hawaii Public Housing Authority to be responsible for the following reports:

- (1) The authority shall file at least once a year with the <u>governor</u> a report of its activities for the preceding fiscal year;
- (2) The authority shall report to the <u>comptroller</u> on moneys deposited in depositories other than the state treasury under section 40-81, and rules adopted thereunder; and
- (3) The authority shall submit an annual report to the legislature on all authority program areas and funds organized by program area, and by fund within each program area, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, that shall provide the following information on the status of its programs and finances:
 - (A) A description of programs being developed in the current fiscal biennium, including a summary listing of the programs, the status of each program, the methods of project financing or loans, and other information deemed significant;
 - (B) A description of programs planned for development during the two ensuing fiscal bienniums, including a summary listing of the proposed programs, the methods of project financing or loans, and other information deemed significant;
 - (C) A status report of actual expenditures made in the prior completed fiscal year from each fund and agent established under this law, estimated expenditures anticipated for the current fiscal year, and projected expenditures for the ensuing fiscal years to be described in relation to specific projects developed to implement the purposes of any program, fund, or agent established under this law;
 - (D) A financial audit and report conducted on an annual basis by a certified public accounting firm; and
 - (E) Recommendations with reference to any additional legislation or other action that may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this law.

SB 739 SD2 HD1 CD1

LAND EXCHANGE; GOVERNOR. Requires the <u>governor</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026 on:

(1) The feasibility of any land exchanges of agricultural parcels of high interest to the State in exchange for urbanized lands for appropriate private development negotiated by the governor as contemplated by this Act, a list of lands suitable for such an exchange, and a description and the market value of the parcels; and (2) Any appropriations, proposed legislation, or administrative action necessary to accomplish the goals of this Act.

Provides that after receipt of the governor's report, the legislature, if not in session, may convene in special session pursuant to article III, section 10 of the Hawaii State Constitution to act on land exchanges proposed pursuant to this Act.

SB 742 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 154)

DATA SHARING AND GOVERNANCE WORKING GROUP. Establishes within the <u>office of</u> <u>enterprise technology services</u> a data sharing and governance working group. Requires the data sharing and governance working group to:

- (1) Review the adequacy of the departmental data sharing pursuant to section 27-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and the data task force pursuant to section 27-44, Hawaii Revised Statutes, in addressing the State's capabilities with regard to data sharing, with focus areas including:
 - (A) The ability of the data exchange partnership to address gaps in data collection, including high school to workforce data, federal employment data, and selfemployment data;
 - (B) Existing barriers to seamless and frequent cross-departmental data sharing;
 - (C) Alignment between existing data-sharing efforts and relevant strategic plans from state and county governments, including the public education system, university of <u>Hawaii</u>, and <u>workforce development council</u>;
 - (D) The ability for unemployment compensation wage record systems to include occupation, pay rate, and work location;
 - (E) Gaps in resources and personnel to effectively collect, share, analyze, and disseminate findings from data; and
 - (F) Needs relating to technology upgrades, data interoperability, and modernization initiatives; and
- (2) Recommend an ongoing data-sharing governance structure that:
 - (A) Identifies a centralized coordinating agency to ensure effective cross-agency direction, collaboration, and accountability;
 - (B) Establishes formal governance structures and timelines for interagency collaboration and data-sharing protocols;
 - (C) Provides a unified, consistent source of information or analysis for policy development and implementation;
 - (D) Develops a framework to guide current management and future improvements;
 - (E) Details a process for developing and prioritizing research questions transparently and inclusively;
 - (F) Details a process for disseminating actionable insights to a broader range of stakeholders, including philanthropic organizations and public-private partnerships;
 - (G) Identifies opportunities to enhance the relevance and usability of system outputs for stakeholders, including <u>policymakers</u> and the <u>public</u>;
 - (H) Supports the creation of public-facing, accessible dashboards;
 - (I) Develops guidelines for stakeholders related to the use of artificial intelligence; and
 - (J) Includes mechanisms to prioritize and address stakeholder feedback.

Requires the data sharing and governance working group to comprise the following members or their designees:

- (1) The <u>chief information officer</u>, who shall serve as the chairperson of the working group;
- (2) <u>One representative of the judiciary</u>, to be appointed by the <u>chief justice of the supreme</u> <u>court</u>;
- (3) The superintendent of education;
- (4) The director of human services;
- (5) The director of health;
- (6) The director of business, economic development, and tourism;
- (7) The director of labor and industrial relations;
- (8) The <u>director of transportation;</u>
- (9) The director of the executive office on early learning;
- (10) The chairperson of the workforce development council;
- (11) The executive director of the Hawaii p-20 partnerships for education;
- (12) The director of the office of planning and sustainable development;
- (13) The president of the university of Hawaii;
- (14) The executive director of the Hawaii state commission on the status of women;
- (15) <u>Two members representing nonprofit organizations having experience in data sharing</u> <u>and governance</u>, of which one member shall be chosen and invited by the <u>speaker of the</u> <u>house of representatives</u> and one member shall be chosen and invited by the <u>president</u> <u>of the senate</u>; and
- (16) <u>Two members representing for-profit business organizations having experience in data</u> <u>sharing and governance</u>, of which one member shall be chosen and invited by the <u>speaker of the house of representatives</u> and one member shall be chosen and invited by the <u>president of the senate</u>.

Requires the data sharing and governance working group to select members for and convene one or more advisory groups to solicit input from a diverse range of stakeholders, including:

- (1) Students and parents;
- (2) Labor and workforce organizations;
- (3) Business and industry representatives;
- (4) Equity and social justice organizations;
- (5) <u>Researchers and privacy experts</u>; and
- (6) Early education experts, school districts, and charter schools.

Allows the office of enterprise technology services to contract with an <u>administrative facilitator</u> to provide necessary support for the data sharing and governance working group in carrying out its duties.

Requires the members of the working group to serve without compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for expenses, including travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties.

Requires the data sharing and governance working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

Requires the data sharing and governance working group to cease to exist on June 30, 2027.

SB 825 SD2 HD2 CD1

PRELITIGATION MEDIATION PILOT PROGRAM. Provides that no later than ninety days after the termination of the prelitigation mediation pilot program established by this Act, the judiciary shall submit to the legislature a report of its findings and recommendations, including recommendations on whether the pilot program should be made permanent, and any proposed legislation.

(SSCR 440, 885, HSCR 1234, 1450, 1937, CCR 218)

SB 850 SD2 HD1 CD1

DISABILITY HEALTH DISPARITY. Requires the <u>state council on developmental disabilities</u> to collect comprehensive data to identify gaps in social determinants of health, especially in the areas of health care access and quality and economic stability, that affect health outcomes and health disparities experienced by <u>individuals with intellectual or development disabilities in the State</u> and that can be addressed with policy, legislative, or stakeholder action.

Requires the state council on developmental disabilities to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027, which shall include a list of recommendations and proposals, based on the council's findings, on how <u>state</u> <u>agencies</u> and <u>departments</u> can implement legislation and policies to reduce health disparities experienced by individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities. Requires the report to also include:

- (1) A definition of the State's intellectual or developmental disability population for public health administration purposes, including the health conditions, duration, and level of severity required to qualify for disability status;
- (2) A definition of the social determinants of health as used by the <u>United States Department</u> of Health and Human Services;
- (3) Population-level differences in the State between individuals with and without intellectual or developmental disabilities on health indicators and social determinants of health, including:
 - (A) Access to necessary health care;
 - (B) Access to preventive health care, including wellness programs and emotional support services;
 - (C) Health behaviors, including the percentage of individuals who engage in physical activities or smoke cigarettes;
 - (D) Health status and outcomes, including the percentage of individuals who are considered obese or diagnosed with chronic diseases, including diabetes, hypertension, and cardiovascular diseases;
 - (E) Drivers of health outcomes, including the impetus to seek health care and how individuals seek health care;
 - (F) Emergency preparedness, including evacuation planning and ability;
 - (G) Health insurance coverage;
 - (H) Social determinants of health and health outcomes, including household income, employment status, education level, access to health information technology tools and systems, access to transportation, and the social and community environment; and

- (I) Other indicators and determinants that contribute to an individual's physical and mental health;
- (4) Factors contributing to the population-level differences, including race, ethnicity, gender, age, county of residence, and economic and social disadvantages and discrimination;
- (5) A determination of the population-level differences and contributing factors that are preventable or avoidable;
- (6) Any other information that would assist the State in determining safe, equitable, and culturally appropriate public health actions that would improve health care and address the health disparities experienced by individuals in the State with intellectual or developmental disabilities; and
- (7) Proposed legislation, including best practices, for the State to reduce the health disparities experienced by individuals in the State with intellectual or developmental disabilities.

Provides that in preparing the report, the state council on developmental disabilities may consult with <u>community stakeholders</u> on the following:

- (1) Improvements to provider training about intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- (2) Life experiences of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- (3) Accessibility mandates for health infrastructure that include the needs of individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- (4) Communication guidelines and standards for health care providers to communicate with individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities; and
- (5) Other topics as deemed relevant by the state council on developmental disabilities.

SB 897 SD3 HD2 CD1

ELECTRIC UTILITIES; WILDFIRES. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, the <u>public utilities commission</u> shall study and submit a report to the legislature that includes:

- (1) An assessment of whether the factors considered pursuant to section 269-B(b) adequately balance the solvency interests of electric utilities with the compensation owed in the previous year to catastrophic wildfire victims, or whether additional factors should be considered; and
- (2) Any other findings and recommendations, including any necessary proposed legislation.

Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, the public utilities commission shall submit a report to the legislature that includes:

- (1) An update on its activities under this law, including how the securitization authorized under this law is being utilized; and
- (2) Any other findings and recommendations, including any necessary proposed legislation.

Requires the public utilities commission to conduct a study to examine the establishment and implementation of a wildfire recovery fund to:

(1) Provide efficient compensation for damage resulting from a future wildfire that was allegedly caused or exacerbated by an electric utility; and

(2) Help protect the financial integrity of Hawaii's regulated utilities.

Requires the public utilities commission to review, examine, and consider the following:

- (1) How a fund would impact utility credit ratings and costs to customers, including comparing how funds in other states have performed;
- (2) Whether the establishment of a fund is recommended;
- (3) If a fund is recommended, a determination of the size of the wildfire recovery fund, which may include commissioning of an actuarial study;
- (4) If a fund is recommended, a determination of the best approach to capitalizing the fund and whether moneys used to capitalize the fund should come from ratepayers or shareholders, or both;
- (5) If a fund is recommended, a determination of the proper governance of the public corporation that would oversee the wildfire recovery fund;
- (6) If a fund is recommended, a consideration of the benefits of an administrative process to provide efficient and low-cost recovery for claimants, and the proper mechanism for providing such an administrative process; and
- (7) A consideration of who can participate in the fund and if parties other than an electric utility should be considered for participation.

Requires the public utilities commission to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026

SB 935 SD2 HD3 CD1

GOVERNMENT; BENEFITS; CREDITED SERVICE. Requires the <u>department of human</u> <u>resources development</u> to conduct a study of the impacts and benefits of reducing, from ten years to five years, the minimum number of years of credited service that qualified tier 2 hybrid class members of the employees' retirement system must have to be eligible for vested benefit status for service retirement allowance purposes.

Requires the department of human resources development to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

STABILIZATION OF PROPERTY INSURANCE. Requires the <u>Hawaii green infrastructure</u> <u>authority</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session that details the progress of the condominium loan program, aggregate data on the loans issued under this provision, and the balance of the condominium loan revolving fund.

Requires the Hawaii green infrastructure authority to submit to the legislature an annual status report on the condominium loan loss reserves program's activities.

Requires the condominium loan revolving fund to be audited at least annually by a firm of <u>independent certified public accountants</u> selected by the authority and provide the results of the audit to the <u>department of business</u>, economic development, and tourism and the legislature. Requires the <u>insurance commissioner</u> to conduct a study to identify or develop a long-term solution to stabilize the property insurance market in the State. Requires the insurance commissioner to include in the study:

- (1) Recommendations for capitalizing the Hawaii property insurance association and Hawaii hurricane relief fund;
- (2) Recommendations for monitoring the stability of the property insurance market in the State;
- (3) A determination of the efficacy of the changes implemented pursuant to this Act;
- (4) An evaluation of the feasibility of establishing a mutual or captive insurance model to address the affordability and availability of property insurance in the State, including solutions to address the needs of condominium associations and individual residential condominium property owners; and
- (5) Recommendations on a mechanism to ensure that condominium properties are maintained and repaired in a timely manner to ensure that the condominium properties remain in insurable condition.

Requires the insurance commissioner to submit reports of the insurance commissioner's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027.

INTERAGENCY FOOD SYSTEMS WORKING GROUP. Establishes within the <u>agribusiness</u> <u>development corporation</u> an interagency food systems working group.

Requires the working group to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>chairperson of the board of agriculture</u>, or the chairperson's designee, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (2) The <u>director of business, economic development, and tourism</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (3) <u>One member of the house of representatives</u>, to be selected by the <u>speaker of the house</u> <u>of representatives</u>;
- (4) One member of the senate, to be selected by the president of the senate; and
- (5) <u>Members with relevant experience</u>, to be invited by the co-chairs.

Requires the interagency food systems working group to:

- (1) Develop governance, decision-making, and operating protocols;
- (2) Coordinate with <u>county</u> and <u>community-led organizations that are involved with food</u> systems planning;
- (3) Identify resources to support interagency food systems coordination and implementation efforts;
- (4) Develop internal and external communication processes;

- (5) Create time-bound implementation plans and ways to measure progress toward statewide food systems goals; and
- (6) Utilize policy impact analysis tools to evaluate proposed actions.

Requires the interagency food systems working group to submit a report of its activities and any recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requires the <u>department of business</u>, <u>economic development</u>, <u>and tourism</u> to provide any necessary administrative support to the statewide interagency food systems coordination team and the interagency food systems working group established under this provision.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS; COUNTIES. Requires <u>each county</u> to conduct a survey of all existing retention and detention ponds located within its jurisdiction and submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

SB 1252 SD2 HD1 CD1

DEMENTIA; TRAINING; UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii at Manoa</u> <u>John A. Burns School of Medicine's department of geriatric medicine</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature beginning December 15, 2025, through December 15, 2027, on the hiring of personnel and accomplishments realized pursuant to this Act.

(SSCR 228, 1068, HSCR 1413, 1966, CCR 197)

SB 1298 SD2 HD2 CD1 (ACT 162)

RECYCLING; ELECTRONIC DEVICES; GOALS; PLANS. Requires the <u>department of health</u>, in consultation with <u>manufacturers</u>, <u>collectors</u>, and <u>other appropriate stakeholders</u>, to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2028. Requires the report to include recommendations regarding:

- The collection weights of electronic devices in Hawaii as reported by collectors and manufacturers, as well as whether there are any other weights of electronic devices available from other entities not currently registered as collectors, if this information is available;
- (2) Whether electronic device collection weights are capable of meeting manufacturer recycling obligations under the existing law; and
- (3) Whether the recycling obligations, including statewide recycling goals, for manufacturers under the existing law should be amended with consideration of the current method based on weight of sales, or other methods such as by weight of prior year collection averages, or other weight metrics adopted in other states.

SCHOOL MEALS; SUBSIDIES. Provides that it is the intent of this provision not to jeopardize the receipt of any federal aid and, only to the extent necessary to effectuate this intent, the <u>governor</u> may modify strict provisions of this provision, but shall promptly report any modification with the governor's reasons therefore to the next succeeding session of the legislature for review.

SB 1304 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 179)

PESTICIDE DRIFT MONITORING; SCHOOLS. Appropriation out of the pesticide use revolving fund the sum of \$323,484 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the sum of \$311,903 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 for the continued monitoring of pesticide drift in schools statewide; provided that:

- (1) The study shall comply with all applicable <u>United States Environmental Protection</u> <u>Agency</u> regulations; and
- (2) After the study is completed, the <u>department of agriculture</u> shall submit a report of the findings and recommendations of the study, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2029.

Requires the sums appropriated to be expended by the department of agriculture.

SB 1322 SD2 HD2 CD1

MENTAL HEALTH; EMERGENCY PROCEDURES; ASSISTED COMMUNITY TREATMENT. Requires <u>each provider of services involved in an emergency transportation initiated by a law</u> <u>enforcement officer, court order, or health care provider; assisted community treatment petition;</u> <u>or assisted community treatment order</u> pursuant to part IV or VIII, and the <u>department of the</u> <u>attorney general</u>, to provide the necessary data to the <u>department of health</u> to complete the report under this provision. Provides that based on this data, the department of health shall submit an annual report to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requires the report to include, at a minimum, an evaluation of the effectiveness of the strategies employed by each provider operating pursuant to parts IV and VIII in reducing hospitalization of persons subject to emergency transportation or assisted community treatment and in reducing involvement with local law enforcement by persons subject to assisted community treatment orders. Requires the evaluation and report to also include any other measures identified by the department of health regarding individuals subject to assisted community treatment petitions and orders and all of the following, based on information that is available:

- (1) The number of individuals brought to each of the facilities operated by service providers through emergency transportation, and the number of those individuals transported due to enforcement of an order for assisted community treatment;
- (2) The number of individuals involuntarily hospitalized through emergency transportation and emergency examination;
- (3) The number of individuals subject to assisted community treatment orders;
- (4) The petitioner's relationship to the individual subject to the assisted community treatment petition;
- (5) The number of individuals under assisted community treatment orders who become involved with the criminal justice system by way of arrests, convictions, probation, incarceration, or other relevant data;
- (6) The need for hospitalization and related length of stay for individuals after they become subject to an assisted community treatment order;
- (7) Adherence to prescribed treatment by individuals subject to an assisted community treatment order; and
- (8) Other indicators of successful engagement, if any, by individuals subject to an assisted community treatment order.

EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM'S EMPLOYER REPORTING REVIEW. Requires the <u>employees' retirement system of the State of Hawaii</u> to annually submit to the <u>department of</u> <u>budget and finance</u> and the legislature, not later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, a report that details the following for the previous fiscal year:

- (1) Any <u>department or agency of the state or counties</u> that failed to comply with this provision; and
- (2) Any amounts required to be paid under this provision, including the anticipated amounts payable in the upcoming fiscal year, and identification of any state budget programs that may be affected.

SB 1377 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 119)

VETERANS CEMETERIES BOARD. Establishes the veterans cemeteries board within the <u>office of veterans' services</u> in the <u>department of defense</u> for administrative purposes only. Requires the veterans cemeteries board to:

- (1) Identify compliance issues faced by veterans cemeteries in the State, the resources needed, and the challenges encountered by departments or agencies that manage veterans cemeteries, and work collaboratively to resolve any issues;
- (2) Devise solutions to address the issues identified in this provision and implement the solutions collaboratively with the <u>state and county departments</u> and agencies represented on the board;
- (3) Seek resources, including funding, legislative initiatives, and intergovernmental program support; and
- (4) Interact with and invite interested <u>community agencies</u>, <u>organizations</u>, <u>stakeholders</u>, and <u>veterans</u> and <u>citizens</u> to participate in discussions and board meetings.

Requires the veterans cemeteries board to consist of the following members:

- (1) The <u>director</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as the chairperson of the board;
- (2) A <u>representative of the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific</u>, by invitation of the director;
- (3) The <u>director of the department within the county of Hawaii that is responsible for</u> <u>operating and maintaining the county's veterans cemeteries</u>, or the director's designee;
- (4) The <u>director of the department within the county of Kauai that is responsible for operating</u> and maintaining the county's veterans cemeteries, or the director's designee;
- (5) The <u>director of the department within the county of Maui that is responsible for operating</u> and maintaining the county's veterans cemeteries, or the director's designee; and
- (6) The <u>cemetery operations manager of the Hawaii state veterans cemetery</u>, or the manager's designee.

Requires the members of the veterans cemeteries board to serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for necessary expenses, including travel expenses, incurred in the performance of their duties. Requires a majority of the members of the veterans cemeteries board to constitute a quorum for the conduct of the business of the board. Requires a majority vote of the members present at a meeting at which a quorum is established to be necessary to validate any action of the veterans cemeteries board.

Requires the veterans cemeteries board to develop strategies and make recommendations to meet compliance standards set by the <u>National Cemetery Administration of the United States</u> <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u>. Provides that in developing the recommendations, the veterans cemeteries board shall create, develop, and adopt a statewide framework, which shall include:

- (1) A clear understanding of the compliance standards for cemetery grounds and maintenance set by the National Cemetery Administration;
- (2) Strategies and recommendations for grounds and maintenance best practices to address the various challenges and conditions of each cemetery location; and
- (3) A standardized system of data collection and information sharing to support the intergovernmental efforts of the board.

Requires the office to provide necessary staff and other support required by the veterans cemeteries board for the performance of its duties.

Requires the veterans cemeteries board to submit a report of the board's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

SB 1434 SD1 HD1 CD2 (ACT 175)

UNIVERSAL IMMUNIZATION FUNDING PROGRAM. Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session of the legislature, the <u>director of finance</u> shall report all central service assessments made during the preceding fiscal year.

(SSCR 424, 1035, HSCR 1314, 1932, CCR 198, HOUSE FLOOR AMENDMENT 5, SENATE FLOOR AMENDMENT 13)

SB 1441 SD2 HD2 (ACT 62)

OAHU REGIONAL HEALTH CARE SYSTEM; HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION; DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH; TRANSITION. Requires the <u>Oahu regional health care system</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027. Requires the report to cover the period of December 1, 2025, through November 30, 2026, and shall include:

- (1) The total number of patients referred to the Oahu regional health care system from the <u>Hawaii state hospital;</u>
- (2) The number of referred patients who were admitted to Leahi hospital;
- (3) For each referred patient who was not admitted:
 - (A) The date the referral was made;
 - (B) The date the Oahu regional health care system staff conducted a clinical assessment of the referred patient;
 - (C) The date the Oahu regional health care system notified the Hawaii state hospital that the patient was not accepted for admission;
 - (D) Leahi hospital nursing facility patient census on the date the Hawaii state hospital was notified the patient was not accepted for admission; and
 - (E) A deidentified summary explaining why the patient was not accepted;
- (4) The minimum and maximum Leahi hospital nursing patient census for each month; and
- (5) Recommendations on how the Oahu regional health care system will be able to admit more patients referred from the Hawaii state hospital.

(SSCR 581, 1007, HSCR 1315, 2001)

SB 1442 SD2 HD2 (ACT 178)

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS. Requires the <u>child and</u> <u>adolescent mental health services team</u> to cooperate with the <u>schools located in their particular</u> <u>geographic region</u> in identifying and referring for treatment such children or adolescents in need of mental health services. Provides that in conjunction with the child and adolescent mental health services team, the <u>department of education</u> and the <u>department of health</u> shall develop a memorandum of agreement which shall provide for a sharing of responsibilities for the affected agencies and shall include but not be limited to provisions for:

- Accepting referrals from the <u>school counselors</u> and <u>diagnostic teams</u> for evaluation and direct treatment of children and adolescents suffering from mental and emotional disorders;
- (2) Providing consultation to enable <u>teachers</u> and <u>other school personnel</u> to aid in the identification and screening of children and adolescents in need of professional mental health services and the services of psychologists, as defined in chapter 465;
- (3) Providing training and education about emotional disturbances of children and adolescents to teachers, <u>school counselors</u>, and <u>parents</u>;
- (4) Assisting the department of education with mental health services and the services of <u>psychologists</u>, as defined in chapter 465 for <u>handicapped children and adolescents</u>;
- (5) Developing an ongoing mechanism to assess, document, and report to the legislature and the <u>governor</u> unmet needs for mental health services for students in each geographic region; and

(6) Performing other related services for school personnel, <u>children</u>, <u>adolescents</u>, and parents.

Provides that commencing no later than twenty days before the convening of the regular session of 2027, and every five years thereafter, the <u>child and adolescent mental health division</u> <u>of the department of health</u> shall develop and submit to the governor and the legislature a current statewide child and adolescent mental health services plan that shall include:

- (1) An assessment of the mental health needs of children and adolescents in the State;
- (2) An assessment of resources available to meet the mental health needs of children and adolescents in the State;
- (3) Identification of gaps between needs and available resources;
- (4) A description of the provisions for prevention, diagnosis, screening, and treatment, which is inclusive of rehabilitation; and
- (5) Recommendations to the <u>governor</u> and legislature on how to meet the mental health needs of children and adolescents.

Provides that before the submission of the statewide child and adolescent mental health services plan under this provision to the governor and the legislature, the department of health shall hold public hearings on the plan in accordance with section 92-41. Requires there to be at least one hearing in <u>each county</u>; provided that the <u>city and county of Honolulu</u> shall have three hearings in strategic geographic locations to provide the widest exposure of the plan to the population.

Requires any amendments to the statewide child and adolescent mental health services plan to be made after public meetings held in accordance with this provision.

SB 1508 SD1 (ACT 21)

STATEWIDE SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PLAN. Requires the <u>safe routes to school advisory</u> <u>committee</u> to:

- (1) Develop a comprehensive, statewide safe routes to school plan that shall include:
 - (A) Goals, strategies, and performance metrics that ensure accountability for improving safety, active transportation mode share, community investment in supportive programming, and infrastructure quality, pursuant to sections 286-7.5 and 264-142;
 - (B) Methods to ensure stability and consistency of the safe routes to school program special fund that shall provide for infrastructure projects and continuity of existing programmatic (non-infrastructure) work;
 - (C) Recommendations to streamline and facilitate efforts by communities to apply for and implement projects pursuant to sections 286-7.5, 264-142, and 291C-3; and
 - (D) Identification of, and recommendations for, additional funding, planning, and programming that are inclusive and equitable pursuant to sections 286-7.5 and 264-142;
- (2) Beginning July 1, 2024, ensure distribution of moneys accrued in the safe routes to school program special fund, prioritizing continuity of existing programming;
- (3) Beginning July 1, 2024, review project proposals and select priority projects within one mile of any school or place of learning, pursuant to sections 286-7.5, 264-142, and

291C-3, to be funded through the safe routes to school program or otherwise be prioritized and implemented by the <u>department of transportation;</u>

- (4) Submit annual reports on the activities and recommendations of the safe routes to school program to the <u>governor</u> and legislature no later than December 31 of each year; and
- (5) Meet no less than monthly.

(SSCR 716, HSCR 1938)

SB 1567 SD1 HD1 CD1 (ACT 180)

CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION SYSTEMS; CIVIL SERVICE. Requires the <u>department of human resources development</u> to complete a comprehensive review of the classification and compensation systems for all civil service positions that are under its jurisdiction by October 31, 2026. Allows the department of human resources development to contract with a <u>third party</u>, in accordance with chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to assist with the timely completion of the review.

Requires the department of human resources development to submit a:

- (1) Preliminary report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than February 28, 2026; and
- (2) Final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

(SSCR 54, 680, HSCR 1322, 1920, CCR 147)

SB 1578 SD2 HD1 CD1 (ACT 158)

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS; PARTNERSHIPS. Requires the <u>center for cultural and technical</u> <u>interchange between East and West, Inc.</u>, to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, which shall include an explanation of the facility maintenance and other functions accomplished by state fund expenditures in the previous fiscal year.

Establishes within the <u>department of business</u>, economic <u>development</u>, and <u>tourism</u>, for administrative purposes only, the <u>Hawaii sister-state and international partnerships commission</u>. Requires the commission to support the <u>governor</u>, <u>legislature</u>, and <u>office of international affairs</u> in building and maintaining strategic long-term sister-state or province partnerships that promote and enrich the people, cultures, environments, and economies of the State and its international partners.

Requires the commission to consist of the following members:

- (1) <u>Three members appointed by the governor</u>, with the advice and consent of the <u>senate</u>; provided that two of the three members appointed by the governor shall be from a list of at least three nominees submitted respectively by the:
 - (A) Office of Hawaiian affairs; and
 - (B) Center for cultural and technical interchange between East and West, Inc.;
- (2) One member appointed by the president of the senate;

- (3) One member appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives; and
- (4) The <u>chairs of the respective senate and house committees with jurisdiction over</u> <u>international affairs or intergovernmental affairs</u>, who shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting members of the commission.

Requires the commission to elect from among its members a chairperson and vice chairperson. Requires members of the commission to serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties. Requires the commission to evaluate and develop recommendations for the initiation of all sister-state or province partnerships and forward its recommendation to the legislature. Requires the legislature, if it so chooses, to implement the recommendation to initiate a sister-state or province partnership by either adopting a concurrent resolution or by enacting session law to that effect.

Requires the commission to periodically evaluate established sister-state or province partnerships and forward its recommendations on maintaining sister-state or province partnerships to the governor and to the legislature.

Allows the commission to make a recommendation to terminate a sister-state or province partnership it deems to be defunct, moribund, or not beneficial and forward its recommendation to the legislature. Requires the legislature, if it so chooses, to implement the recommendation to terminate a sister-state or province partnership either by adopting a concurrent resolution or by enacting session law to that effect.

SB 1602 SD1 HD1 CD1 (ACT 189)

KEAUHOU AQUIFER SYSTEM MONITORING; HAWAII ISLAND. Requires the <u>department of</u> <u>land and natural resources</u> to establish a Keauhou aquifer system monitoring pilot project.

Provides that under the pilot project, the <u>commission on water resource management</u>, in collaboration with <u>other agencies</u>, shall:

- (1) Collect data from the monitoring wells installed in the Keauhou aquifer system;
- (2) Monitor groundwater levels in the Keauhou aquifer system;
- (3) Conduct water salinity tests in the Keauhou aquifer system;
- (4) Monitor the impacts of groundwater pumping on the health of coastal ecosystems and traditional and customary practices within the Keauhou aquifer system;
- (5) Initiate public information meetings to report on the data collected;
- (6) Conduct community outreach to guide the management of groundwater resources in the Keauhou aquifer system;
- (7) Integrate new and existing studies and research into a plan for the responsible management of groundwater resources in the Keauhou aquifer system; and
- (8) Conduct other related activities as the department deems necessary to carry out the purpose of the pilot project.

Requires the department of land and natural resources to submit an interim report to the legislature every six months, detailing, at minimum, groundwater levels and water salinity analysis in the Keauhou aquifer system.

Provides that based on the department of land and natural resources' assessment of the Keauhou aquifer system monitoring pilot project, the department shall determine whether to continue, expand, or end the pilot project.

HB 3 HD2 SD1 CD1 (ACT 100)

BEACH MANAGEMENT; NORTH SHORE; OAHU. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii sea grant</u> <u>college program</u> to submit the north shore beach management plan to the <u>governor</u> and legislature by December 1, 2026.

(HSCR 17, 295, 1030, SSCR 1131, 1514, CCR 40)

HB 126 HD1 SD2 CD1

HAWAII OMNIBUS CRIMINAL FORFEITURE ACT. Provides that no less than forty days before the convening of each regular session, the <u>attorney general</u> shall provide to the legislature a report on the use of the Hawaii omnibus criminal forfeiture act during the fiscal year preceding the legislative session. Requires the report to include:

- (1) The total amount and type of property seized by <u>law enforcement agencies;</u>
- (2) The total number of administrative and judicial actions filed by <u>prosecuting attorneys</u> and the disposition thereof for each action;
- (3) The total number of claims or petitions for remission or mitigation filed in administrative actions and the dispositions thereof for each action;
- (4) The total amount and type of property forfeited and the sale proceeds thereof;
- (5) The total amount and type of property distributed to units of state and local government;
- (6) The amount of money deposited into the criminal forfeiture fund; and
- (7) The amount of money expended by the attorney general from the criminal forfeiture fund under this provision and the reason for the expenditures.

(HSCR 618, 1131, SSCR 1238, 1527, CCR 231)

HB 132 HD1 (ACT 5)

STATE-INITIATED EXPUNGEMENT PROCESS; PILOT PROJECT. Provides that for purposes of this pilot project, the <u>Hawai'i criminal justice data center</u> will use existing resources, without any additional appropriations, and will report to the legislature on progress and lessons learned, which can better inform future legislation concerning state-initiated expungement.

(HSCR 795, SSCR 1366)

HB 235 HD1 SD1 CD1

TRAFFIC SAFETY; NORTH SHORE; OAHU. Requires the <u>department of transportation</u> to submit a report about its progress in implementing the expanded use of photo red light imaging detector systems and automated speed enforcement systems to locations on the North Shore of Oahu to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026.

Establishes within the <u>Hawaii state energy office</u> an electric vehicle battery recycling and reuse working group to examine how to maximize the recycling and reuse of electric vehicle batteries and recommend electric vehicle battery management practices.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Develop a plan for best management practices for the recycling, reuse, or repurposing of electric vehicle batteries;

- (2) The <u>director of health</u>, or the director's designee, who shall serve as the co-chairperson of the working group;
- (3) <u>One representative from the department of environmental services of the city and county</u> <u>of Honolulu;</u> and
- (4) One representative from the Hawaii natural energy institute.

Requires the co-chairpersons of the working group to invite the following individuals to serve as members of the working group:

- (1) <u>Two representatives from the electric vehicle manufacturing industry;</u>
- (2) <u>One representative from the automotive repair industry;</u>
- (3) One representative from the battery energy storage industry;
- (4) One representative from the electronic waste recycling industry;
- (5) One representative from an electric utility;
- (6) <u>One representative from an organization that specializes in extended producer</u> responsibility policy;
- (7) <u>One representative from an environmental organization that specializes in waste</u> reduction and recycling;
- (8) One representative from the automotive recycling industry;
- (9) <u>One representative from a company specializing in the recycling of electric vehicle</u> <u>batteries;</u> and
- (10)<u>Other individuals</u> as invited by the co-chairpersons.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027. Requires the report to include an analysis of:

- Opportunities for and barriers to the reuse of electric vehicle batteries as a first option, as potential stationary energy storage systems as a second option, and for recycling as a third option, taking into account the additional costs of transporting electric vehicle batteries to be recycled out of State;
- (2) Best practices for the management of electric vehicle batteries at end-of-life;
- (3) The cost, safety, and environmental impacts of in-state versus out-of-state recycling options;
- (4) The feasibility of pursuing any recycling options outside of the United States;
- (5) The feasibility in terms of costs, available infrastructure, and enforcement of an electric vehicle battery recycling program;
- (6) The overall effect of different management practices on the environment; and
- (7) Any other factors deemed necessary and relevant.

Requires the working group to be dissolved on June 30, 2027.

HEALTH CARE APPROPRIATENESS AND NECESSITY WORKING GROUP. Establishes the health care appropriateness and necessity working group within the <u>state agency</u>. Requires the working group to:

- (1) Determine by research and consensus:
 - (A) The most respected peer-reviewed national scientific standards;
 - (B) Clinical guidelines; and
 - (C) Appropriate use criteria published by <u>federal agencies</u>, <u>academic institutions</u>, and <u>professional societies</u>,

that correspond to each of the most frequent clinical treatments, procedures, medications, diagnostic images, laboratory and diagnostic tests, or types of medical equipment prescribed by <u>licensed physicians and other health care providers in the</u> <u>State</u> that trigger prior authorization determinations by the utilization review entities;

- (2) Assess whether it is appropriate to require prior authorization for each considered clinical treatment, procedure, medication, diagnostic image, laboratory and diagnostic test, or type of medical equipment prescribed by licensed physicians and other health care providers;
- (3) Make recommendations on standards for <u>third party reviewers related to the specialty</u> <u>expertise of those reviewing and for those discussing a patient's denial with the patient's health care provider;</u>
- (4) Recommend appropriate time frames within which urgent and standard requests shall be decided;
- (5) Monitor anticipated federal developments related to prior authorization for health care services and consider these developments when making its recommendations;
- (6) Assess industry progress toward, and readiness to implement, any recommendations; and
- (7) Make recommendations on treatments for common chronic or long-term conditions for which prior authorization may remain valid for the duration of the treatment in the appropriate clinical setting.

Requires the <u>administrator of the state agency</u> to invite the following to be members of the working group:

- (1) <u>Five members representing the insurance industry</u>, to be selected by the <u>Hawaii</u> <u>Association of Health Plans</u>;
- (2) <u>Five members representing licensed health care professionals, two of whom shall be</u> selected by the <u>Hawaii Medical Association</u>, two of whom shall be selected by the <u>Healthcare Association of Hawaii</u>, and one of whom shall be selected by the <u>center for</u> <u>nursing</u>; and
- (3) Five members representing consumers of health care or employers, two of whom shall be selected by the <u>board of trustees of the Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust</u> <u>fund</u>, one of whom shall be a consumer selected by the <u>statewide health coordinating</u> <u>council</u>, one of whom shall be selected by the <u>Hawaii Primary Care Association</u>, and one of whom shall be selected by <u>Papa Ola Lokahi</u>.

Requires the members of the working group to elect a chairperson and vice chairperson from amongst themselves. Requires the <u>director of health</u>, <u>insurance commissioner</u>, and <u>administrator of the med-QUEST division of the department of human services</u> to each appoint an ex-officio advisor for the working group.

Requires the working group to submit a report of its findings and recommendations regarding information under this provision, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026 and each regular session thereafter.

Requires the recommendations of the working group to be advisory only and not mandatory for <u>health care facilities</u>, <u>health care professionals</u>, <u>insurers</u>, and <u>utilization review</u> <u>entities</u>. Requires the state agency to promote the recommendations among health care facilities, health care professionals, insurers, and utilization review entities and shall publish annually in its report to the legislature the extent and impacts of its use in the State.

- (3) Approve of memorandums of understanding with submitted working plans to execute control and eradication programs; and
- (4) Include in its annual report to the legislature pursuant to section 150A-57 any memorandums of understanding and partnerships pursuant to this provision to advance the State's invasive pest control and eradication biosecurity efforts.

Requires the coordinator to compile and consolidate information from the office to effectuate this provision and submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, which shall include:

- (1) Data on the number of beds, occupancy, duration of stay, types of services provided, and next planned destination of participants who left the ohana zone;
- (2) An evaluation of the ohana zones to determine whether the objectives set have been met or exceeded; and
- (3) Any proposed changes that need to be made to the performance measures used to assess the achievement of program goals.

Requires the statewide office on homelessness and housing solutions to submit a report to the legislature every four months detailing the expenditure of funds appropriated pursuant to this Act, as well as any appropriations made toward the kauhale or ohana zones initiatives. Requires each report to include:

- (1) A list of all contracts executed during the preceding quarter;
- (2) Supporting documentation detailing the use of funds; and
- (3) A status update on all operations and buildings using any allocated funds made by the State for the preceding quarter.

Requires the statewide office on homelessness and housing solutions to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment on the services, temporary housing, permanent housing, and continuum of care within <u>each county</u> with a plan to address the outstanding needs in the most cost-effective manner. HOMELESS YOUTH; SHELTER. Establishes within the <u>office of youth services</u> a safe spaces for youth program, which shall provide, subject to the availability of funds, safe spaces in <u>each</u> <u>county</u> for youth and young adults experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.

Requires the program to collaborate with <u>all departments of the State and its political</u> <u>subdivisions</u> that offer services for the purpose of ensuring the well-being of youth and young adults in Hawaii, including the <u>department of education</u>, <u>department of corrections and</u> <u>rehabilitation</u>, <u>department of health</u>, <u>department of human services</u>, <u>department of land and</u> <u>natural resources</u>, <u>department of law enforcement</u>, <u>state office on homelessness and housing</u> <u>solutions</u>, <u>county police departments</u> and <u>other agencies</u>, and <u>judiciary</u>, to coordinate the identification of youth and young adults who are experiencing homelessness, and placement of these youth and young adults at a shelter for homeless youth or young adults.

Allows the office of youth services to enter into contracts with <u>nonprofit organizations</u> to provide services for youth or young adults experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness. Requires any nonprofit organization contracted under this provision to have the knowledge, experience, and qualifications, including licenses as needed for child caring institutions, and other requirements to operate a shelter for homeless youth or young adults experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. Prohibits youth under the age of eighteen to be sheltered with young adults age eighteen to twenty-four.

Provides that notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, a shelter for homeless youth or young adults contracted under this provision may admit a youth into the shelter's care for up to ninety days without the consent of the youth's parent or guardian.

Requires the office to submit a report pertaining to the safe spaces for youth program to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

COMPUTER SCIENCE; REPORT. Provides that by October 31, 2025, and by each October 31 thereafter, the <u>superintendent</u> shall submit to the board and legislature a report of the computer science courses and computer science content offered during the previous school year at the schools in each complex area. Requires the report to include:

- (1) The names and course codes of the computer science courses offered at each school;
- (2) The number and percentage of students enrolled in each computer science course and computer science content, disaggregated by:
 - (A) Gender;
 - (B) Race and ethnicity;
 - (C) Special education status, including students eligible for special education under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, as amended, or section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended;
 - (D) English language learner status;
 - (E) Eligibility for the free and reduced price lunch program; and
 - (F) Grade level;

provided that if a category contains one to five students, or contains an amount that would allow the amount of another category that contains one to five students to be determined, the number of students shall be replaced with a symbol indicating that one to five students fulfilled that particular category;

- (3) The names and course codes of the courses containing computer science content and a description of the computer science standards and content that are covered by those courses; and
- (4) The number of computer science instructors at each school, disaggregated by:
 - (A) Any applicable certification;
 - (B) Gender;
 - (C) Race and ethnicity; and
 - (D) Highest academic degree earned.

HB 648 HD1 SD1 CD1

GUARDIANSHIP AND CONSERVATORSHIP SERVICES; PILOT PROGRAM. Requires the <u>judiciary</u> to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the <u>governor</u> and legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the

regular sessions of 2026 and 2027 on the guardianship- and conservatorship-related court resources pilot program and include the following information aggregated by each type of court:

- (1) The status of the guardianship- and conservatorship-related court resources pilot program;
- (2) The number of people served by the pilot program;
- (3) The number of people who received resources from the pilot program who otherwise would not have been able to pay for these resources;
- (4) Recommendations as to whether the pilot program should continue as a pilot program, be made permanent, or be discontinued; and
- (5) If continuation or permanency of the pilot program is recommended, recommendations for funding for the program.

HB 700 HD1 SD2 CD1

DEMENTIA DATA PILOT PROGRAM. Establishes a dementia data pilot program within the <u>executive office on aging</u> to collect and analyze cognitive assessment data for the purposes outlined in the Hawaii 2035: State Strategic Plan on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias.

Allows the executive office on aging to collaborate with a <u>health care system</u> to identify <u>health</u> <u>care providers</u> to participate in the pilot program.

Allows a health care provider participating in the pilot program to provide a report to the executive office on aging no later than October 1 of each year. Allows the report to include but not be limited to:

- (1) Whether the qualified patient declined the cognitive assessment;
- (2) Whether the qualified patient is exempt from a cognitive assessment and the reason for the exemption;
- (3) The date of the cognitive assessment;
- (4) The address where the cognitive assessment was conducted and whether the cognitive assessment was conducted in person or via telehealth;
- (5) The qualified patient's age, zip code, race, and gender;
- (6) The type of cognitive assessment administered;
- (7) The result of the cognitive assessment; and
- (8) Any follow-up actions taken, including subsequent referrals and further diagnosis and treatment.

Allows the executive office on aging to secure the transmission and storage of the information reported pursuant to this provision for the purposes of the pilot program.

Requires the executive office on aging to provide a report summarizing the information collected pursuant to this provision to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2027 and 2028. Requires the report to be made available to the public on the <u>department of health's</u> website.

Requires any reports submitted to the legislature and subject to publication under this Act to be limited to aggregated data and shall not directly contain or indirectly result in the disclosure of personally identifiable information.

Requires the identity, or any group of facts or any system of records that may lead to the identity, of any qualified patient who has received a cognitive assessment pursuant to this Act to be confidential and shall not be revealed in any report, release, or publication.

Requires the dementia data pilot program to be dissolved two years from its start date.

MEDI-MEDI PROJECT; EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON AGING. Establishes within the <u>advocacy</u>, <u>education</u>, <u>and outreach section of the executive office on aging</u> a medi-medi project to assist older adults, medicare beneficiaries, individuals with disabilities, and other underserved populations who may qualify for various low-income subsidy programs, including medicare, medicaid, and medicare savings programs such as medicare part D extra help, to gain access to their benefits.

Requires the medi-medi project to:

- (1) Develop and implement a community outreach program;
- (2) Streamline the application process for various low-income subsidy programs; and
- (3) Provide referrals and assistance to other low-income programs.

Requires the executive office on aging to submit a report of its findings and recommendations regarding the medi-medi project, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requires the executive office on aging to develop a one-year pilot project to provide the medimedi project to kupuna and families living in a disadvantaged community, specifically the Kalihi valley catchment areas.

Requires the executive office on aging to submit a report of its findings and recommendations regarding the pilot project, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

HB 727 HD1 SD2 CD1

WOMEN'S COURT PILOT PROGRAM, HAWAII ISLAND. Establishes within the <u>third circuit</u> <u>Kona division of the judiciary</u> the women's court pilot program. Requires the women's court pilot program to be under the supervision of the <u>big island drug court</u>. Requires the judiciary to be responsible for providing mental health services under this pilot program. Requires the pilot program to implement trauma-informed and evidence-based practices, employ genderresponsive programming, collaborate with stakeholders, and provide services to women in the court system with the goal of diverting participants from incarceration, supporting their success in the community, and reducing recidivism. Requires the services offered by the pilot program to address the following areas:

- (1) Trauma and mental health treatment;
- (2) Family support, including parenting, education, and relationship improvement;
- (3) Life-skills training;
- (4) Education and vocational training;
- (5) Domestic violence prevention;
- (6) Medical services and health education;
- (7) Substance abuse detection, prevention, and treatment;
- (8) Mentoring; and
- (9) Housing support.

Requires the judiciary to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, on the pilot program to the <u>governor</u> and legislature no later than forty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027, regarding:

- (1) The status of the women's court pilot program;
- (2) The number of women accepted into the women's court pilot program;
- (3) The number of women who were eligible to participate in the women's court pilot program but who could not be accepted into the pilot program because of pilot program limitations;
- (4) The number of women completing the women's court pilot program;
- (5) The number of women who were removed from the women's court pilot program; and
- (6) Recommendations as to whether the women's court pilot program should:
 - (A) Continue as a pilot program;
 - (B) Expand to include additional participants;
 - (C) Provide additional services; or
 - (D) Be discontinued.

HB 736 HD1 SD1 CD1 (ACT 198)

WASTEWATER SYSTEM TESTING; PILOT PROGRAM. Establishes a three-year new wastewater system and individual wastewater system technology testing pilot program within the <u>university of Hawaii water resources research center</u>.

Requires the university of Hawaii water resources research center, in coordination with the <u>university of Hawaii sea grant college program</u> and <u>college of engineering</u>, <u>department of health</u>, <u>department of Hawaiian home lands</u>, and <u>all appropriate county agencies</u>, to:

- (1) Test new wastewater technology systems and review and evaluate the affordability, feasibility, and efficiency of the treatment technologies; and
- (2) Document, validate, and summarize the various tests, research, and outcomes of each test of wastewater systems and individual wastewater systems and submit results of the tests to the <u>department of health</u>.

Requires the university of Hawaii water resources research center to submit an annual interim report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session

for the duration of the pilot program and a final report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2028. Requires the reports to include:

- (1) Information on the new wastewater technologies reviewed and tested and test results;
- (2) Recommendations on how to improve the efficiency of the pilot program;
- (3) Whether the pilot program should be made permanent; and
- (4) Any other recommendations that the university of Hawaii water resources research center deems appropriate.

Requires the pilot program to cease to exist on June 30, 2028.

HB 750 HD2 SD1 CD1 (ACT 103)

PACKAGING WASTE; NEEDS ASSESSMENT; ENVIRONMENT. Requires the <u>department of</u> <u>health</u> to conduct a statewide needs assessment to determine what will be needed to reduce waste generation, increase reuse, improve collection services, and expand local processing of materials through an extended producer responsibility program for packaging materials and paper products.

Requires the department of health to conduct the assessment in consultation with the following stakeholders:

- (1) Each county department responsible for waste management;
- (2) <u>Global and national producer responsibility organizations, including producer</u> responsibility organizations actively working on reusable packaging systems;
- (3) Producers of packaging materials and paper products;
- (4) Refuse and recycling collection and processing service providers;
- (5) Compost facility operators;
- (6) Retailers, including restaurants, wholesalers, and distributors;
- (7) <u>Organizations and community groups involved with waste management and waste</u> reduction; and
- (8) Environmental and human health scientists;

provided that <u>additional stakeholders</u> may be included as the department deems necessary and relevant.

Allows the department of health to contract for professional services to conduct the needs assessment.

Requires the department of health to convene an advisory council to review the draft needs assessment and propose recommendations throughout the assessment process. Requires the advisory council to include:

- (1) One representative from each county department responsible for waste management;
- (2) One representative from a national producer or producer trade association;
- (3) One representative from a Hawaii-based producer or producer association;
- (4) <u>Two representatives who are experts or operators of reuse, refill, or circular economy</u> <u>systems;</u>
- (5) One representative from a Hawaii-based refuse service provider;

- (6) <u>One representative from a Hawaii-based recycling collection and processing service provider;</u>
- (7) <u>One representative from a Hawaii-based retailer, including restaurants, wholesalers, or</u> <u>distributors;</u>
- (8) <u>Two representatives from Hawaii-based organizations and community groups involved</u> with waste management or relevant environmental advocacy;
- (9) One representative who is an environmental or human health scientist;
- (10)<u>One representative from a business that manufactures consumer packaged goods for sale in the State;</u> and
- (11) One representative from the composting industry.

Requires the department of health to hold a public hearing to obtain comments on the draft needs assessment.

Requires the department of health to complete and submit the needs assessment, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature by December 31, 2027.

HB 774 HD2 SD1 CD1

FOOD AND PRODUCT INNOVATION NETWORK. Establishes within the <u>agribusiness</u> <u>development corporation</u> the food and product innovation network. Requires the network to operate under a centralized coordination structure administered by the corporation to ensure alignment in standards, programming, and strategic direction across all facilities statewide. Requires the purpose of the food and product innovation network to be to:

- Allow businesses in the State to capitalize globally on the "Hawaii made", "made in Hawaii", "produced in Hawaii", or "processed in Hawaii" brand, pursuant to section 486-119;
- (2) Create world-class products; and
- (3) Scale up production by providing the businesses with access to a diverse suite of manufacturing equipment and industry expertise.

Requires partner members of the food and product innovation network to include:

- Future facilities to be developed on lands set aside by executive order to the corporation in Kekaha, on the island of Kauai; a to-be-determined location on the island of Hawaii; and additional facilities on the islands of Maui, Molokai, and Oahu to expand regional support and enhance statewide coverage;
- (2) The foreign-trade zone facility in Hilo, on the island of Hawaii;
- (3) The <u>university of Hawaii Maui college food innovation center</u>, on the island of Maui; and
- (4) The <u>university of Hawaii Leeward community college value-added product development</u> <u>center in Wahiawa</u>, on the island of Oahu.

Requires the food and product innovation network to:

(1) Offer a range of resources within the wider network to support innovation and business development, including courses and events relating to food and value-added product development, entrepreneurship, marketing, branding, business management, workforce development, intellectual property protection, and other topics;

- (2) Provide new product development support from early-stage trials to commercialization by establishing a network of facilities with equipment of various scales, providing expert advice, and offering resources tailored to the regional economies;
- (3) Provide low-risk commercial production with appropriate certifications for exporting products and selling products locally;
- (4) Provide recommendations on process optimization by offering advice and networking, identifying and testing equipment, planning trials, and analyzing results;
- (5) Increase exports by securing facilities and developing compliance programs for off-shore markets; provided that each county shall have no more than two food and product innovation network facilities that produce products labeled "Hawaii made", "made in Hawaii", "produced in Hawaii", or "processed in Hawaii" pursuant to section 486-119;
- (6) Develop entrepreneurs to grow the State's economy;
- (7) Prepare businesses to scale up and achieve autonomous business success and sustainability;
- (8) Establish pathways from early-stage innovation through commercialization, including pilot testing, certification, and support for accessing capital and distribution channels;
- (9) Facilitate partnerships with research institutions, educational organizations, and private sector partners to strengthen innovation pipelines, technology transfer, and applied research opportunities; and
- (10) Engage with national and international partners, including foreign innovation networks, to support shared learning, exchange of best practices, and cooperative programming that advances innovation, sustainability, and commercialization outcomes.

Provides that no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, the corporation, on behalf of the food and product innovation network, shall submit a report to the legislature that includes:

- A description of the food and product innovation network's activities and progress in the preceding year, including the activities and progress of primary members and partner members, in response to the directives established pursuant to this provision;
- (2) An assessment of any progress made in growing the State's agriculture industry, food industry, and related industries, and in meeting the State's food security goals; and
- (3) Any proposed legislation.

HB 778 HD2 SD1 CD1 (ACT 187)

INTEGRATED LAND USE STUDY. Requires the <u>office of planning and sustainable</u> <u>development</u> to conduct an integrated land use study for agricultural districts as classified under section 205-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Requires the purpose of the integrated land use study to be to:

- (1) Develop land use data that can be used for planning and decision making for the competing uses of lands within agricultural districts; and
- (2) Determine the land use feasibility and needs of lands within agricultural districts to meet the State's climate, sustainability, and housing statutory targets.

Requires the integrated land use study to incorporate the recommendations of:

- (1) The Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan pursuant to section 226-65, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
- (2) The state land use review of districts;
- (3) The Hawaii sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation report pursuant to section 225P-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and
- (4) The State's climate, sustainability, and housing statutory targets, as needed.

Requires the integrated land use study to also consider the Hawaii state plan update phase one and the soil classification study required pursuant to Act 189, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022.

Requires the integrated land use study to include recommendations for each county.

Provides that in conducting the integrated land use study, the office of planning and sustainable development shall:

- (1) Develop data-based estimates on the amount of land required to meet the competing uses of lands within the agricultural districts by compiling and analyzing existing data from various government entities, including the department of agriculture; department of transportation; department of land and natural resources; department of business, economic development, and tourism; Hawaii state energy office; Hawaii housing finance and development corporation; public utilities commission; and the counties. Secondary input shall be sought from the <u>university of Hawaii</u>, <u>utility companies</u>, <u>nonprofit</u> agricultural organizations, the agricultural community, and <u>other organizations</u> or entities deemed appropriate by the office;
- (2) Clearly define and prioritize the protection of productive agricultural lands to prevent further encroachment from non-agricultural developments, including developing measures to ensure agricultural lands designated for agriculture production are not compromised for short-term development needs;
- (3) Include direct input from the agricultural community to ensure the study reflects the realities and needs of farmers and ranchers;
- (4) Conduct outreach to ensure county and community input and acceptance; and
- (5) Once the initial compilation of data is completed, analyze the available acreage in each county along with the potential impacts for the proposed changes.

Requires the office of planning and sustainable development to submit an interim report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2026 on the progress of developing data-based estimates and the progress of the integrated land use study and a final report to the legislature and the <u>land use commission</u> no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

HB 799 HD2 SD2 CD1 (ACT 92)

ORGANIZED AMBULATORY HEALTH CARE FACILITIES; PHYSICIANS. Prohibits a <u>physician</u> <u>practicing at an organized ambulatory health care facility</u> to be required to have hospital privileges at a licensed hospital in the same geographical location as the organized ambulatory health care facility. Requires this provision to apply to counties with populations of less than five hundred thousand.

Requires the <u>department of health</u> to conduct an evaluation of the benefits and impacts of section 323- , Hawaii Revised Statutes, established by this Act, on local health care systems, surgical access, and financial stability. Requires the evaluation to include but not be limited to assessing access to health care, quality of care, and costs. Requires the department to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027.

HB 800 HD1 SD2 CD1

REAL PROPERTY; PUBLIC LANDS; TRANSFER. Requires this Act to take effect on July 1, 2025, or the day after final approval by the <u>city and county of Honolulu</u> of the terms of the transfer of the fee simple interest in land pursuant to part II of this Act, whichever occurs later; provided that upon the completed transfer of the fee simple interest in land pursuant to part II of this Act, the <u>governor</u> shall notify the legislature and the <u>revisor of statutes</u> that the transfer was filed or recorded with the <u>bureau of conveyances</u>; provided further that if the city and county of Honolulu does not finalize approval of the terms of the transfer required under part II of this Act by December 31, 2026, this Act shall be repealed on January 1, 2027, and section 171-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in the form in which it read on the day before the effective date of this Act.

HB 960 HD1 SD1 CD1

HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS; CAPITAL ADVANCEMENT CONTRACTS. Requires the <u>department of transportation</u> to submit a report to the legislature of all executed capital advancement contracts for the previous twelve-month period from July 1 to June 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

(HSCR 375, 1099, SSCR 1296, 1790, CCR 211)

HB 961 HD1 SD1 CD1 (ACT 135)

LIBRARIAN PILOT PROGRAM. Establishes within the <u>department of education</u> a two-year pilot program for two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) certified librarians to provide rotating support services to one school complex on Oahu and one school complex on a neighbor island. Requires the department of education to determine which school complexes shall be part of the pilot program.

Requires the department of education to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027. Requires each report to include findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, about the pilot project established pursuant to this provision. Requires the report submitted prior to the convening of the regular session of 2027 to make a recommendation as to whether the pilot project should be extended.

Requires the pilot program to cease to exist on June 30, 2027.

HB 1001 HD1 SD3 CD1

MAUI WILDFIRES SETTLEMENT TRUST FUND. Requires the <u>department of the attorney</u> <u>general</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of each regular session that shall include their receipts and disbursements of the Maui wildfires settlement trust fund for the prior fiscal year.

(HSCR 688, 980, SSCR 1081, 1226, 1838, CCR 249)

HB 1007 HD2 SD2 CD1

TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Hawaii community development authority</u> to submit an annual comprehensive report on the progress of the program to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requires the Hawaii community development authority to notify the legislature upon the issuance of the revenue bonds authorized by this Act, including a detailed list and description of all projects to be funded through the revenue bonds authorized by this Act.

(HSCR 144, 694, 975, SSCR 1346, 1837, CCR 239)

HB 1051 HD1 SD1 CD1

ENERGY-EFFICIENCY PORTFOLIO STANDARDS. Requires the <u>public utilities commission</u> to evaluate the energy-efficiency portfolio standards every five years, beginning in 2013 to determine if the energy-efficiency portfolio standards established by this provision remain effective and achievable and may revise the standards, based on the best information available at the time. Requires the public utilities commission to report its findings and revisions to the energy-efficiency portfolio standards, based on its own studies and other information, to the legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of the regular session of 2014, and every five years thereafter.

HB 1064 HD2 SD2 CD1

STATE FIRE MARSHAL; REPORT. Provides that beginning with the regular session of 2027, no later than twenty days before the convening in each odd-numbered year of a regular session, the <u>office of the state fire marshal</u> shall submit to the legislature a report regarding the activities of the state fire marshal and the counties in implementing this law.

Requires the report to include, at a minimum:

- (1) A status report concerning:
 - (A) Community risk reduction; and
 - (B) The establishment, administration, and enforcement of defensible space requirements;
- (2) The amount of moneys expended during the previous fiscal biennium for:
 - (A) Community risk reduction;

- (B) The establishment, administration, and enforcement of defensible space requirements; and
- (C) Fire suppression; and
- (3) Any recommendations for the state fire marshal for legislative action, including but not limited to current or future resource and funding needs for:
 - (A) Community risk reduction; and
 - (B) The establishment, administration, and enforcement of defensible space requirements.

HB 1093 HD1 SD1 CD1 (ACT 89)

HOUSING PROJECTS; PARTNERSHIP; DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENTS. Requires the <u>Hawaii public housing authority</u> to submit an annual report to the legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, on the status of all housing projects being developed using partnership or development agreements pursuant to this provision.

HB 1159 HD2 SD1 CD1

COMMERCIAL HARBORS EMERGENCY EVACUATION WORKING GROUP. Establishes the <u>commercial harbors emergency evacuation working group</u> within the <u>department of</u> <u>transportation</u> for administrative purposes.

Requires the working group to:

- (1) Review current federal and state laws regarding emergency evacuation procedures for commercial harbors;
- (2) Determine whether there is adequate space in commercial harbors for all vessels to moor should they be required to evacuate Honolulu harbor and come up with a comprehensive mooring plan; and
- (3) Review and evaluate whether current federal and state penalties are sufficient to ensure compliance with emergency evacuation orders for commercial harbors.

Requires the working group to consist of the following:

- (1) The <u>deputy director of the harbors division of the department of transportation</u> who shall serve as chair of the working group;
- (2) The <u>chairs of the senate and house of representatives standing committees whose</u> <u>subject matter purview includes transportation;</u>
- (3) The <u>United States Coast Guard captain of the port Honolulu sector</u>, to be invited by the chair of the working group; and
- (4) Users of the commercial harbors that are invited by the chair of the working group including but not limited to transpacific ocean carriers, interisland ocean carriers, a representative of the Hawaii Longline Association, a representative of the United Fishing Agency, cruise line operators, and tug and barge operators.

Requires the chair of the working group to provide an option to attend each meeting remotely.

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII CONFERENCE CENTER REVOLVING FUND. Requires the <u>university of Hawaii</u> to submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, accounting for all income and expenditures of each separate account within the revolving fund.

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII RELIEF FUNDING. Provides that any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the <u>board of regents</u> may authorize expenditures of up to \$3,000,000 annually, excluding in-kind services, from this fund for the purposes of promoting alumni relations and generating private donations for deposit into the <u>University of Hawaii Foundation</u> for the purposes of the <u>university of Hawaii</u>. Requires any expenditure authorized pursuant to this provision to be for a public purpose and shall not be subject to chapters 42F, 103, 103D, and 103F. Requires the university to submit a comprehensive report to the legislature detailing the use of any funds authorized by the board under this provision no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

- (1) Identify each department of the University of Hawaii Foundation supported by moneys from the fund;
- (2) Describe the purposes and activities of each department identified in this provision and how it participates in fundraising activities and benefits the university;

- (5) Provide a financial summary of the operating activities of the University of Hawaii Foundation, including revenues and expenditures by major reporting categories; and
- (6) Identify amounts and purposes of all expenditures from the university of Hawaii support fund.

Provides that any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the board of regents may authorize expenditures of up to \$3,000,000 annually, excluding in-kind services, from the university of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund for the purposes of providing student aid in direct response to an emergency or a disaster, as declared by the governor. Requires the university to submit a comprehensive report to the legislature detailing the use of any funds authorized by the board under this provision no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Provides that no later than October 1, 2025, the governor and administrator of the Hawaii emergency management agency shall submit to the legislature a summary report containing the information specified in this Act for the previous fiscal year.

- (12) The state historic preservation division of the department of land and natural resources;
- (13) The wastewater branch of the department of health; and
- (14) The state building code council of the department of accounting and general services.

Requires the task force to invite the following individuals to participate in the task force:

- (1) <u>Representatives from each of the offices of the State's Congressional delegation;</u>
- (2) <u>Representatives from each of the county planning and permitting departments;</u> and
- (3) An individual having knowledge, experience, and expertise in the area of labor.

Requires members to be designated no later than August 1, 2025.

Requires the task force to hold its first meeting no later than sixty days after the finalization of its members or October 1, 2025, whichever is earlier.

Requires the members of the task force to serve without compensation for their service on the task force.

Requires the task force to cease to exist on June 30, 2027.

TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT; RENTAL HOUSING REVOLVING FUND. Provides that for the period commencing July 1, 2005, through June 30, 2009, the fund may be used to provide grants for rental units set aside for persons and families with incomes at or below thirty per cent of the median family income in any project financed in whole or in part by the fund in proportion of those units to the total number of units in the project. Provides that at the conclusion of the period described in this provision, the corporation shall report to the legislature on the number and use of grants provided and whether the grants were an effective use of the funds for purposes of developing rental housing for families at or below thirty per cent of the median family income.

Requires the <u>Hawaii interagency council for transit-oriented development</u> to report annually to the governor, the legislature, and the mayor of each county on the progress of its activities, including formulation and progress on the strategic plan no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.

Requests the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to convene a task force to study light pollution and dark skies to ensure the preservation of dark skies throughout the State.

Requests the chair of the task force to invite the following individuals to participate as members of the task force:

- (1) <u>A representative of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service;</u>
- (2) A representative of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration;
- (3) A representative of the United States Military;
- (4) <u>A representative of the Federal Aviation Administration;</u>
- (5) A representative of the United States Coast Guard;
- (6) <u>A representative of the Federal Highways Administration;</u>

- (7) <u>A member of the Hawaiian Astronomical Society;</u> and
- (8) <u>A representative from the DesignLight Consortium</u>.

- (9) Public safety issues related to the reduction in artificial light, as well as over-lighting that produces glare and light trespass; and
- (10) Additional considerations the task force believes will help protect dark night skies in the State.

Requests the task force to submit an interim report of its progress to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2025, and a final report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2026.

Requests the Department of Health to provide administrative support to the task force.

Requests the task force to submit a report to the Legislature, including any recommendations and proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026.

 - (D) Review and enhance existing biodiversity-related laws, plans, and programs to maximize conservation impact and identify necessary legislative or policy changes; and
 - (E) Fund existing and new conservation initiatives to effectively address local stressors, including sediment and nutrient runoff, invasive species, and unsustainable harvesting practices.

WETLANDS; ANCHIALINE POOLS; PROTECTIONS. Urges the <u>Department of Land and</u> <u>Natural Resources</u> to prioritize the restoration and protection of additional wetlands in the State.

Urges the <u>Division of Aquatic Resources of the Department of Land and Natural Resources</u> to apply the protective policies afforded to wetlands to the State's anchialine pools.

Requests the <u>County of Maui</u> to ensure that the protection of wetlands, especially wetlands in Kihei on the Island of Maui, is prioritized over development concerns, where feasible.

AXIS DEER OVERPOPULATION; PROCESSING FACILITIES; VENISON. Urges the <u>State</u> <u>Department of Agriculture</u> and <u>County of Maui Department of Agriculture</u> to take further meaningful action to address the axis deer overpopulation, including:

- (1) Implementing policies to make <u>United States Department of Agriculture</u>-certified in-state inspectors, certified inspections, and certified processing facilities more accessible, capable, and affordable for local hunters to utilize in order to sell or gift venison; and
- (2) Implementing policies to increase the amount of certified United States Department of Agriculture in-state meat inspectors for game mammals.

Urges the State Department of Agriculture and County of Maui Department of Agriculture to convene a joint task force to oversee the County of Maui program that, in coordination with the United States Department of Agriculture certified processing facilities, would aim to investigate and develop plans to make affordable the processing of locally hunted axis deer meat and the distribution of this venison to the community;

Requests the joint task force to submit a report of the program's accomplishments and barriers to the accomplishment of the program with its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than November 30, 2025.

Requests the County of Maui to collaborate with the <u>Maui Metropolitan Planning Organization</u>, <u>Maui County Planning Department</u>, and <u>Maui County Council</u> to identify and designate the specific location for the northern terminus of the North-South Collector Road, ensuring that it effectively integrates with existing and planned transportation infrastructure.

Requests the County of Maui to submit a status report on the planning and development of the northern terminus of the North-South Collector Road to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026.

MILITARY-LEASED LANDS; ECONOMIC ANALYSIS. Urges the <u>Department of Land and</u> <u>Natural Resources</u> to conduct a comprehensive economic analysis of all military-leased lands that assesses the following:

- (1) Lost economic opportunities from the unavailability of these lands for beneficial trust purposes pursuant to section 5(f) of Public Law 86-3, including agriculture, education, and housing, and the betterment of conditions of Native Hawaiians;
- (2) The comprehensive costs for cleanup, including contaminants and unexploded ordnance of trust lands;
- (3) The costs of restoration and development of these trust lands to productive economic use;
- (4) Lost income to the State had these trust lands been leased at fair market rents, instead of the \$1 leases agreed to between the State and the United States; and
- (5) Lost tax dollars to the State had these trust lands been utilized for productive purposes under section 5(f) of Public Law 86-3.

Urges the Department of Land and Natural Resources to establish a formal public process for the lease renewal negotiations, including public hearings, community consultations, and stakeholder engagement, ensuring that all affected parties have an opportunity to provide input before any new agreements are signed.

Requests the Department of Land and Natural Resources to submit a report, detailing the findings of the comprehensive economic analysis and outlining its plans for future lease negotiations, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026.

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES; MILITARY INSTALLATIONS; ACCESS TO ALL HAWAI'I RESIDENTS. Urges the <u>United States Department of Defense</u> to make recreational facilities on military installations in Hawaii accessible to all Hawaii residents.

Resolves that the recreational facilities on military installations that the Department of Defense is requested to make accessible include but are not limited to:

- (1) Hale Koa Hotel, an Armed Forces Recreation Center located in Waikīkī, which offers hotel accommodations, dining facilities, and entertainment facilities;
- (2) Bellows Air Force Station, located in Waimānalo, which provides beachfront cabins, camping sites, and various outdoor recreational activities;

- (3) Pililā'au Army Recreation Center, situated on Pōka'ī Bay on the Leeward Coast of O'ahu, which offers beachfront cabins and facilities for water sports and family gatherings;
- (4) Barbers Point Recreation Area, located on the western coast of O'ahu, which offers rental cottages and beach access;
- (5) Kīlauea Military Camp Recreation Area, located within Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park on Hawai'i Island, which provides lodging and recreational facilities;
- (6) Marine Corps Base Hawai'i, located on Kāne'ohe Bay, which offers various recreational facilities, including beaches, camping sites, and a golf course;
- (7) Hickam Harbor Recreation Area, located at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, which offers sailing, surfing, snorkeling, paddleboarding, and kayaking;
- (8) Schofield Barracks, located in central O'ahu, which provides various recreational facilities, including swimming pools, fitness centers, and a golf course;
- (9) Fort DeRussy, which is home to the United States Army Museum of Hawai'i and offers recreational spaces in Waikīkī; and
- (10) Pacific Missile Range Facility Barking Sands, located on Kaua'i, which offers beach cottages and recreational facilities.

Requests the <u>United States Department of Defense</u> to develop guidelines to facilitate safe and secure public access to these facilities, taking into account successful models implemented in other jurisdictions.

IMPORT SUBSTITUTION; ECONOMIC GROWTH AND DIVERSIFICATION. Requests the <u>State of Hawaii</u> to consider import substitution as a key strategy for economic growth and diversification.

Urges the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u>; <u>Department of</u> <u>Agriculture</u>; and <u>Hawaii Technology Development Corporation</u>, among <u>other relevant agencies</u>, to:

- (1) Identify sectors in which local production can feasibly replace a significant portion of imported goods, such as food, energy, technology components, and consumer products;
- (2) Propose policy measures, incentives, and funding mechanisms that encourage private investment in local production and reduce barriers to entry for local entrepreneurs and small businesses;
- (3) Collaborate with <u>private industry</u>, <u>research institutions</u>, and <u>community organizations</u> to foster innovation, workforce development, and knowledge transfer, drawing on Hawaii's historical precedents and the successes of Asian economies that have implemented import substitution policies;
- (4) Examine the historical experiences of the Kingdom of Hawaii, Territory of Hawaii, and State of Hawaii to determine how governmental support, infrastructure development, and resource management contributed to local industry growth and how these lessons can be adapted to modern economic realities;
- (5) Develop a comprehensive report, with input from <u>stakeholders in agriculture</u>, <u>manufacturing</u>, finance, and tourism, outlining a strategic plan to implement import substitution in Hawaii as part of an overall effort to diversify the economy;

- (6) Take steps to avoid and prevent new import dependencies, including the importation of fossil fuels, such as liquefied natural gas; and
- (7) Leverage monopsony powers to substitute existing imports and avert new import dependencies.

Requests the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; Department of Agriculture; and Hawaii Technology Development Corporation to submit a joint report of their findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026.
